## Message from the Village President

### State Budget

Although a compromise budget was approved in the Assembly and Senate, there are many issues that directly impact local governments. There are fee increases that were placed in the bill that weren't publicized prior to the compromise. In some cases, legislators used the power of their vote to place earmarks in the budget that served only their own interest. Politicians on both sides of the aisle have misused the power of their vote to take advantage of the taxpayers at this critical moment. The levy freeze of 2% contained in the budget made for good political press but failed to address the real issue, proper funding for State mandated programs. The Governor's subsequent line item veto of the 2% cap simply served to fan the flames of division between the parties. Hopefully, future budget negotiations can be conducted with the aim of serving the best interest of the citizens of the State.

On our local level, we are seeing the results of the TIF tools we have been using to foster redevelopment of areas in the Village. Bradley Road is being transformed with good progress being made at three different sites. The dental clinic, the new commercial site being developed by General Capital, and the new Tri City bank building under construction at the former Kohl's store location. The level of development in this area has created additional inquiries about the remainder of the site and hopefully will lead to future announcements about other potential projects.

The Brown Deer Road and 60th Street condominium project is well under way and is also spurring new proposals for the remainder of the site and surrounding sites that are available for redevelopment. The performance of our TID districts meets our expectations. Finally, the Wheaton Franciscan-Schroeder YMCA development plans have a conceptual approval from the Plan Commission and are moving through the design process.

Recently you may have read about the Village Board considering a Sex Offender Ordinance. This ordinance was adopted for the protection and safety of our residents and limits the residence of convicted sex offenders. If you wish to have more information on this ordinance, it is posted on the Village web site.

The AT&T video legislation bill was recently approved by the State of Wisconsin. The bill was pushed by a lobbyist who spent a great amount of money running an advertising campaign promoting competition in the cable industry. The lobbyist really only presented a partial picture of the truth. AT&T will only be available to a select few. In fact, many homes in Brown Deer will not have access to this service. The previous system did allow for competition, including AT&T. The new legislation was created without any input from municipal officials. Municipal officials attempted to offer changes which were included in the State of Illinois legislation and would help protect consumers. These requested changes were not heard. Don't expect savings as a result of the new law. AT&T has offered their product in Texas for a couple of years and prices for video services have not gone down. The only thing this legislation accomplished was to allow AT&T and cable companies to receive greater

## Bike Path Paved

After several years of planning and coordination the Brown Deer Recreational Trail was recently upgraded from a loose gravel to a fully paved asphalt path. The trail extends from County Line Road in the north to Brown Deer Road in the south and serves as an extension of the Ozaukee Interurban Trail. Village work was coordinated with We Energies and the Office of the Commissioner of Railroads to ensure appropriate dimensions and access for utility line trucks, particularly around facilities near Brown Deer Road. The paved segment was also designed with a width of 8 feet to facilitate police department patrol and with an eye towards future linkages south of Brown Deer Road. The cost of the paving was offset by a Community Development Block Grant and financial assistance from cellular telephone carriers who use the path to access antenna sites. Please note that motor vehicle parking is not allowed on WE Energies' property near the electrical sub-station. **For your safety, always remember to stay on the paved trail surface.**

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# Around Our Village

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## Upcoming Projects

- Village Staff is working with the engineering firm of Ayres and Associates to devise a preliminary streetscape design for the Original Village. The area of focus is bounded by Brown Deer Road to the north, Green Bay Road to the east and south and the CN Railroad line to the west. Basic geometry and layout is to be refined by December of 2007. Public and local business input will be sought beginning in January 2008.
- The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) is proposing to reconstruct both directions of Brown Deer Road from the intersection of Kildeer Court to Interstate 43. Utility work is proposed in 2008 with reconstruction to take place in 2009. Village Staff is working with WisDOT on intersection design, alternative routing and pedestrian improvements.
- The Village of Brown Deer recently was awarded two grants from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR). The grants will facilitate: 1) Stream bank stabilization and naturalization of Beaver Creek, from Brown Deer Road to 60th Street ; 2) Subsurface stormwater treatment devices north of Brown Deer Road near 51st Street. Work on both projects will take place in Summer 2008.
- The Village is in the process of selecting a consulting firm to conduct comprehensive planning efforts beginning in January 2008 and lasting through the middle of 2009. The project will produce a Village master plan as required by State of Wisconsin Statutes. It will help to guide land use and development in Brown Deer through 2030. Public participation will be strongly encouraged throughout the effort. Elements to be evaluated as part of the plan will include: land use and zoning, economic development, natural resources, housing, and utilities.

## Call for More Poll Workers

For the Presidential elections there will be a need for more poll workers (also known as election inspectors). Election inspectors are required to work the entire Election Day from 6:30 a.m. to approximately 9:00 p.m., when all the paperwork is completed at the polling place. Rate of pay is \$100 for the day and training is required prior to each election. The Village is seeking residents that must have good hearing, can sit for long periods of time, are fast/efficient in finding names and numbers in the poll books, have good penmanship if registering voters, and follow directions.

## Wisconsin Law Now Permits High School Students to Work the Polls on Election Day

The State Elections Board encourages high school students to get involved in the political process and to provide additional workers to serve at the polling place on Election Day. The Village is seeking interested high school students who would want to work the elections as voter registrars in various four-hour shifts. Students must be residents of Brown Deer, be 16, 17 or 18 years of age, have an A-B average, and have the consent of their parents and the high school. Students would be paid \$7.00 per hour for each hour worked and for attending the training.

# Inside Village Hall

## *Views from Russell Van Gompel, Village Manager*



I would like to share with you some of my views and thoughts regarding the preparation and adoption of the 2008 Budget. The budget process involves many hours of staff, elected officials, and committee members' time and consideration. It began with the distribution of materials to Department Heads in July and continued through September, October, and into November. The Public Hearing for

the 2008 Budget occurred on November 5th, with the adoption occurring on November 19th.

What made this budget process more difficult than in previous years is the fact that the State of Wisconsin was so late in approving their budget. The final approval by the Governor occurred at the end of October, more than four months after the State started their fiscal year. About 15% of our revenue comes through the State of Wisconsin in various programs. The State of Wisconsin provides funds through a shared revenue program, transportation aids, and a payment for exempt business computers. The payment for exempt computers is the largest State payment received by the Village of Brown Deer. However, this payment was reduced by close to \$62,000 from last year. In 2008, the State will pay over \$292,000 for exempt business computers. At its peak in 2002, the Village was receiving over \$569,000 for exempt computers. This has caused increasing pressures on the Village's dependency on property taxes.

This year the Village was again faced with a levy cap imposed by the State of Wisconsin. This cap limits the increase in the tax levy to the percentage change due to new construction or 3.86%, whichever is greater. Early on during the budget preparations, the best information regarding the State Budget process was that the State was considering a cap of 2%. In order to limit the growth in the property tax levy to 2%, I proposed to use \$150,000 from reserves that were created when the Village sold the fire station to the North Shore Fire Department. The reserve account was set up to protect the Village from experiencing increases in the operational cost of the fire department. The Village has used small amounts from this reserve over the last six years.

Over two meetings, the Village Board debated the use of the reserve and the amount of taxes to levy. In the end the Village Board adopted a budget levy of \$7,318,776, or \$133,459 below the statutory limit. The tax levy increase was capped at 2%. If the Village continues to use \$150,000 from this reserve fund each year, the fund will be completely used up by the year 2013.

General Fund expenditures are increasing by 2.53%. The General Fund accounts for most of the day-to-day expenditures of the Village. To meet this small increase, the tax levy within the General Fund increased by 2.41%. Tax levies are needed to fund other portions of our budget. These other portions include debt service, capital projects, equipment needs, the park and pond fund, and a small portion for the 4th of July event.

Tax levies for the Park and Pond Fund, 4th of July Fund and Debt Service fund will remain at 2007 levels. There is a slight decrease in the net tax amount for capital improvements by decreasing the tax levy for the Capital Improvement Fund by \$27,711 and increasing the levy for the Equipment Revolving Fund by \$22,975.

With the 2008 Budget, the individual property taxpayer will have a Village assessed tax rate of \$8.55 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. This is an increase of \$0.38 or 4.65% from the previous assessed tax rate of \$8.17. Based on the average home value of \$143,000, the typical Brown Deer homeowner will pay \$1,227.78 for municipal services, which is an increase of \$54.57 over last year.

Please remember that the Village services only represent 27% of your total tax bill. The largest portion, 44%, is controlled by the Brown Deer School District, a separate taxing authority. Other taxing authorities consist of Milwaukee County (16%), MATC (7%), MMSD (5%), and the State of Wisconsin (1%).

Much time and effort went into the process to prepare this financial plan and 2008 Budget for the Village. I hope you have a better understanding of the budget process and I would like to personally extend a Happy Holiday season to all Village residents.

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## North Shore Fire Department

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### Help the Fire Department- Adopt a Fire Hydrant

As winter approaches, help the Fire Department by adopting the fire hydrant closest to your home or business and keep it free of snow during the winter.

At a fire, the Fire Department must quickly locate and gain a water supply source from the closest fire hydrant. A fire engine carries enough water on board for approximately 3 minutes of firefighting. If a fire hydrant is buried by snow, it is difficult to find and valuable time must be spent digging it out. It may take from 4 to 6 minutes to dig out a fire hydrant buried by snow. The delay in gaining a water supply from a fire hydrant may disrupt the timely manner in which firefighters are able to fight the fire and may allow a fire to grow.

You can help the Fire Department by adopting the fire hydrant closest to your home or business. Keep the snow clear from around the fire hydrant and shovel a path from the street or roadway up to the fire hydrant. These actions will allow the Fire Department to quickly locate a fire hydrant and obtain a water supply for firefighting activities.

## Fire Safe Holidays – A Reason to Celebrate

The year-end holiday season - Thanksgiving, Christmas, Hanukkah, New Year's - is also fire season, a prime time for residential fires.

North Shore Fire Department encourages you to follow these important tips to ensure safe and memorable holidays.

### Christmas Trees

- Consider an artificial tree, they are much safer and cleaner.
- Select only fresh trees that are deep green in color, have a strong scent of pine, and do not lose their needles readily.
- Do not rely on chemical sprays to make your tree flame resistant.
- Keep trees in water-holding stands and keep stands full of water.
- Place trees away from heat sources and a safe distance from exits.

### Lights

- Buy and use lights approved by a national testing laboratory.
- Discard any lights that have frayed or worn cords, broken or cracked sockets, loose connections, bare wires, or operate intermittently.
- Never use indoor lights outdoors.
- Do not overload electrical outlets (three sets of lights per single extension.)
- Do not run extension cords under carpets, across doorways, or near heaters.
- Unplug lights when you leave your home or before going to bed.

### Holiday Flames

- Keep matches, lighters and candles out of children's reach.
- Never leave candles unattended.
- Keep candles in sturdy holders and away from combustibles.
- Do not wear loose fitting clothing near open flames of a fireplace, candle, or stove.
- Burn only well-seasoned, dry wood in your fireplace.

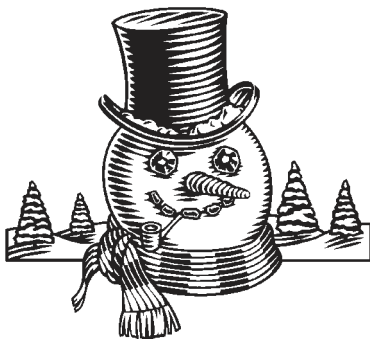
### New Year Celebrations

- Provide smokers with deep, non-tip ashtrays and check under furniture and in trash cans for smoldering cigarettes.
- At a party, be sure the exits are clear.
- Use chafing dishes with caution.
- Attend professional fireworks displays.

## Additional Vaccines Available

We now have **HPV vaccine** for girls age 11-19. We also offer **Menactra vaccine** for people age 11-19.

If you live or work with infants, consider getting a Tdap vaccine. This is like a tetanus booster, with additional protection from pertussis, or whooping cough. There was a large pertussis outbreak in Wisconsin in 2005. Adults can have pertussis, feel well, and spread the infection to incompletely vaccinated infants. Pertussis can be serious or fatal for them.

No appointments are needed. Most vaccines are free or \$15. All recommended immunizations for children and adults are available.

## More Animals Tested for Rabies

The Health Department has submitted 13 animal specimens to the State Laboratory of Hygiene for rabies testing this year. Humans had either confirmed or suspected bites or scratches from the animals. None of the specimens, which include 6 bats, 4 cats, 1 dog, 1 skunk and 1 raccoon, were infected with rabies.

People usually know when they have been bitten by a bat. However, because bats have small teeth which may leave marks that are not easily seen, there are times when you should seek medical advice even in the absence of an obvious bite wound. For example, if you awaken and find a bat in your room, see a bat in the room of an unattended child, or see a bat near a mentally impaired or intoxicated person, call your doctor or clinic. Call us at the Health Department for advice in catching the bat safely so we can have it tested for rabies.

## Radon – Is it in your home?

Test your home for radon. The Health Department has easy, accurate test kits for only \$5. We also have information on the health effects of radon and how to reduce elevated radon levels.

## Travel Safety in Winter Weather

When the snow flies keep in mind that you are sharing the road with plow and salt trucks. For your safety and the safety of our drivers, please maintain a following distance of at least 150 feet.

## Recycling Center Winter Hours

Beginning December 1, 2007 the recycling center will be open on Saturdays from 10 a.m. until 5:50 p.m. (Gates close **promptly** at 6:00 p.m.) During times of adverse weather, the Recycling Center may close early.

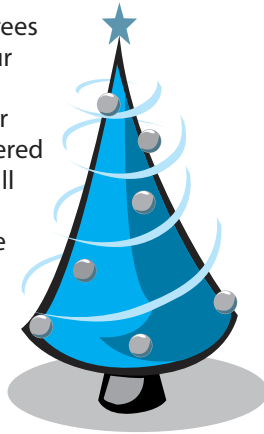
## Holiday Trash Collection

Trash and recycling collection will **change** a bit during the holiday season, as the holidays fall on Tuesdays. During the weeks of December 25th and January 1st, collections (Tues.-Fri.) will shift forward one day (Wed.- Sat.).

Did the holidays leave you with additional trash? Recycle as much as possible and please put any trash that does not fit in your cart in bags and place at the roadside next to your trash cart. **Do not use large cardboard boxes as trash receptacles** as they will not be picked up. Please collapse and bundle all cardboard as directed by Waste Management.

## Christmas Tree Disposal

Waste Management collects Christmas trees and decorative evergreen items with your **regular refuse**. Because many trees and wreaths are sprayed with fire retardant or wrapped with wires, they are not considered yard waste. Anytime after the holidays, all you need to do is set the items out for collection with your regular refuse. Make sure that the items do not get buried in the snow. Waste Management recommends that you stand the trees up on end next to your waste bin so they can be easily collected.



## Do you know where your trash cart is?

**Snow plows do not stop to move trash carts – do not put your trash in the road!**

Village Code states that trash and recycling receptacles should not be placed at the roadside prior to 6:00 p.m. on the day before collection, and all containers should be removed from the roadside by 8:00 p.m. on collection day. For the safety of pedestrians and motorists, waste containers should be placed on the end of your driveway and **not in the road**. If your cart or recycling bin is damaged contact Waste Management 800-640-5571 for replacement.



## Winterize Your Culvert

Once the leaves have fallen, take the time to clean out your culvert (the pipe that runs below your drive approach). By clearing the pipe of leaves and debris it will be ready for snow-melt and spring rains. Flush the culvert out using your garden hose and a piece of pipe long enough to push any debris that may be stuck. You may need to clear away built up turf and dirt from the culvert ends. By maintaining your culvert now, you can limit or prevent water back up in your ditch in spring.

## Think Spring! – Dreaming of a New Driveway?

When considering plans to replace your existing driveway or approach, remember to contact the Department of Public Works. Before work begins you need to obtain a Drive Approach/Culvert Permit. The Superintendent of Public Works will inspect your current culvert and determine if it needs to be replaced. All culvert replacements are done by the Department of Public Works and begin as soon as the ground is thawed. Call the DPW with any questions (414)357-0120.

## Village Pond Parking Lot Reconstruction Project:

Stormwater management has been one of the main focuses of Village public works projects since the devastating floods of the late 1990's. The focal point has gradually evolved from one of controlling the quantity to improving the quality.

First came the management of the amount of runoff through projects like razing the houses along W. Churchill Lane and replacing them with a stormwater retention basin, widening and deepening Southbranch Creek as it passes by the Library and replacing several bridge structures on both Southbranch and Beaver Creeks.

For the past several years the Village has been designing and building methods of improving the quality of stormwater (rain and snowmelt) runoff before it enters the local streams, which are tributaries of the Milwaukee River. The river eventually flows into Lake Michigan, the source of our drinking water.

Cleansing stormwater runoff can be done in several ways, although in a developed urban area such as ours, where open space is at a premium, space-saving measures are often employed. During the last two years the Village has installed six underground structures which allow dirt and debris to settle out before the water is discharged into the streams. Another way to approach the matter is to intercept the water before it reaches the pipes that would otherwise convey it to the streams. This method has been used successfully in a recent commercial development whereby the parking lot is designed to contain a section of specially designed pavement, called pervious pavement, which allows the runoff to filter through the pavement and into a stone layer, where impurities are removed before the water makes its way downstream.

In early 2007, as staff was preparing plans and specifications for the reconstruction of the asphalt parking lot adjacent to the Village Pond, it became apparent that an opportunity had arisen for the Village to utilize the same processes that it requires of private development, both as a way to improve the quality of the runoff and as a demonstration project to show future developers how it should be done.

When you visit the Village Pond next summer on a hot, sunny day, pay attention to the large area of asphalt in the center of the Pond lot that looks a little rougher than the rest. That is the pervious pavement area. When it rains, water will have the appearance of "soaking in" to the pavement, where it eventually makes its way into a pipe that you'll find discharging to the ditch along the west edge of the lot. You'll then notice the naturalized appearance of the ditch, where the concrete bottom was removed and replaced with a natural stone bottom along with native plants growing along the banks. Native plants will also fill a rain garden that will be planted in an island located in the lot. This approach is termed a "treatment train", as there are several methods used that complement each other.

The Village of Brown Deer, along with many other communities across the country, have come to recognize the value of managing stormwater in a way that's more in keeping with the way Mother Nature originally intended, because it's our most precious resource.



## How Do Brown Deer Water Utility Bills Compare?

The Wisconsin Public Service Commission does an annual comparison of water bills throughout the state. While every water customer uses different amounts of water, the average residential water customer in the state uses 18,750 gallons in a quarter. Using this comparative benchmark, Brown Deer customers enjoy water bills that are 39 percent less than the state average. More relevant is a comparison in the Milwaukee Metro area. The table which follows shows that Brown Deer ranks 11th out of 37 area water utilities. We hope you enjoy our high quality water and service too!

The Village of Brown Deer Park and Recreation Department is responsible for the development and operation of recreation programs and park facilities in Brown Deer. Department policies and procedures are governed by the Brown Deer Park and Recreation Committee. Committee meetings are held on the first Tuesday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Village Hall. Meetings are open to the public.

The Department office is located in the Lower Level of the Village Hall at 4800 W. Green Brook Drive. **Office hours are 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. The office telephone is (414) 371-3070.**



## Registration

Complete the registration form on Page 8 and include payment in the form of a check or money order payable to the Village of Brown Deer.

**Resident** registrations received by mail or drop box, located in front of Village Hall at the east end of the circle drive, will be processed in the order received. **Nonresident** registrations will be accepted beginning **Monday, January 7.**

## Residency Policy

Individuals who live in the Village of Brown Deer and students who attend Brown Deer schools may register for department programs as residents. **2008 Resident I.D. Cards** may be obtained in the Park and Recreation Department during office hours or from the Village Hall receptionist.

## Fees and Refunds Policy

The program fees are established to recover the direct operational costs of each facility and program. All fees must be paid at the time of registration. Fees will not be prorated for individuals who are unable to attend all sessions of a program.

Full refunds will be issued if a program is cancelled or changed by the Park and Recreation Department. When a single program session is cancelled due to weather or change in facility availability, no refunds will be issued.

Full or partial refunds of instructional and membership fees will be issued only in situations when an individual or family is unable to participate because of a medical condition, change in schedule, or unusual circumstance. Full or partial refunds of instructional and membership fees will be subject to a 20% administrative fee.

**REGISTER EARLY!** - If a program does not meet its minimum registration requirement within five days of the start, the program may be cancelled.

## Program Policies

**INCLEMENT WEATHER** - No programs will be held when the schools are closed due to inclement weather. Telephone **(414) 371-3071** for cancellations. The information will be prerecorded.

**INSURANCE** - The Park and Recreation Department does not provide hospital or medical insurance coverage for individuals who participate in sponsored programs. Participants are advised to obtain their own insurance coverage prior to registration in any program.

**PHYSICIAN REFERRAL** - Participants, who are over 40 years of age or who have health problems, are advised to consult a physician prior to registration in adult fitness programs.

**CHILD CARE** - Child care is not provided for adult programs. Children are not permitted to attend adult programs without supervision of another adult who is not actively participating in the activity.

**PROGRAM CONFIRMATIONS** - Confirmations will not be sent. Assume you are enrolled and plan to attend unless otherwise notified.

**WAITING LISTS** - The Park and Recreation Department will make every effort to accommodate individuals on waiting lists. If an opening becomes available, you will be contacted by telephone.

Pursuant to the Americans with Disabilities Act, the Brown Deer Park and Recreation Department will make all reasonable accommodations for persons with disabilities to participate in department programs, services and activities. If you require special accommodations to participate in a department program, please let us know when you register.

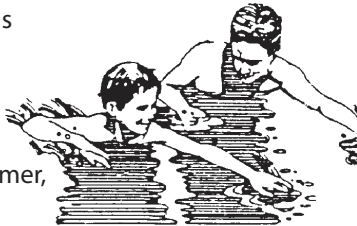

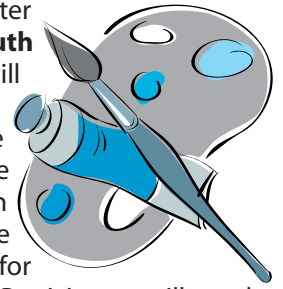
