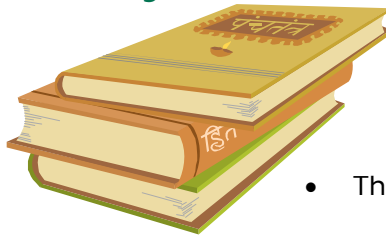

- Mary Dunn attended a webinar on the CountyCat redesign on Wednesday, August 11.

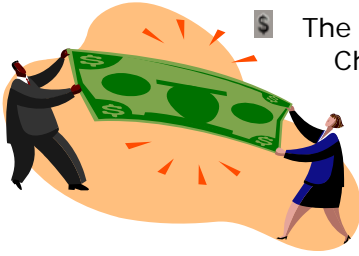
## Water

- Responded to the water main break and flooding at TAPCO on August 8th. The water service main to the facility burst, and flooded the building causing severe damage. Water department worked with TAPCO staff to provide temporary water service to the facility while the owner is working on replacing the existing water service main.
- Operating the Booster Disinfection station, which is increasing the incoming chloramines residual from 1.0 ppm (parts per million) to 2.0 ppm.
- Investigated a customer low pressure situation. We test the pressure and flow at the main, at the meter, and inside the home. The result was typical for the plumbing in Brown Deer – the problem was the galvanized iron plumbing in the home which corrodes inside causing an internal narrowing of the pipe.

## Administrative Services



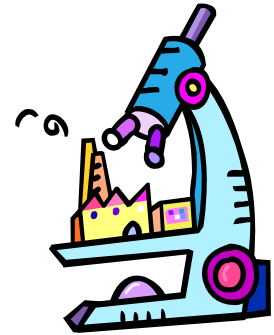
§ The Deputy Treasurer/Comptroller attended the Budget Academy training in Chicago offered by the GFOA.

## Community Services

- Conducted a pre-construction meeting with Village staff and staff from Terry's Excavating Inc., the contractor awarded the contract for the Village Park Bike Trail & Railroad Crossing and Deerbrook Trail Sidewalk Extension Project. Construction began on Friday, August 6.
- Staff members prepared the 2011 Capital Improvements Program. There are three major road reconstruction projects identified for the next couple of years; West Dean Road from North 55th Street to North Teutonia Avenue, West County Line Road from West Village Limits to the Canadian National railroad tracks and North 60th Street from West Fairy Chasm Road to West County Line Road.
- Requested quotes for several styles of prefabricated transit shelters. The transit shelters would be looked along the Milwaukee County Transit Route 12 as part of a Community Development Block Grant project to improve the transit stops and make them all fully ADA accessible.
- Staff participated in a conference call with engineers from Lowes to discuss alternatives for correction to damaged porous pavement at the Lowes Brown Deer store at 6300 West Brown Deer Road.
- The Building Board approved the sign package for Haagen-Dasz/Coffee Beanery, 4301 west Bradley Rd.
- At the request of the Grounds and Maintenance supervisor for the schools, inspected Dean School's flooded HVAC tunnel and discovered structural damage to the support columns for the building. Dean School is closed until clean-up is accomplished and repairs can be made. Kelman Corporation is handling the project and plans completion by the time school commences.
- Conducted a final inspection at Haagen Dasz, 4301 West Bradley Road and created a punch list for occupancy. Electrical Inspector, Jon Fischer, conducted and approved the electrical inspection.
- The Building Inspector met with Matt Mertons, NSFD, at Stratford Village Town Homes to conduct a final inspection of the underground parking garage. Created a punch list for occupancy and gave verbal approval for residents to move back into their apartments, with the understanding that no vehicles are allowed to be parked in the garage until punch list items are completed and inspected.

## Public Works



- Flood clean up dumpsters pulled from streets, DPW crews responding to calls from residents as they come in. Clean up efforts will continue thru August 16th.
- Placing first level of shoulder stone along binder.
- Continue with street sweeping and cleanup. Beginning ditch cleaning at 46th, 47th, Churchill and 48th to match repaved streets. Finished shaping the south side of Churchill to meet new road alignment and added about 0.75 acre feet of storm water storage to South Branch Creek. Area now needs to be landscaped and seeded.
- The North Shore communities met to discuss sanitary sewer issues. Private property Inflow/Infiltration (PPI/I) and Storm Water funds will be available from MMSD for the next six years (2010 – 2015). After the July 22nd event, MMSD increased the funds from \$1 million (divided among metro communities by equalized value) to \$5 million/\$1 million (\$31 million total for the period) and would allow storm water funds to be used for PPI/I. The technical staff of each community agreed that 1) Sewer laterals to homes need to be inspected and sealed. 2) That the communities work toward a common plan to present to their boards/councils. 3) The plan address immediate and long range I/I goals for laterals. Assignments were made to each community and the group will meet in 2-3 weeks to review collected data. Any consultants hired by any community will remain separate from this study, but information between each can be exchanged as the community would permit.

## North Shore Health Department



- As of August 3, 2010, there have been 35 human cases of WNV (West Nile Virus) reported from 12 states. The largest number of cases was reported in Arizona. Wisconsin has not had a human case of WNV, but has had another type of arboviral disease called Powassan virus (POWV) which is also caused by mosquitoes.
- Health Department staff had a display at the Brown Deer National Night Out. Information about Lyme disease and beach water safety was handed out.
- The student nurses from Marquette have completed the community health portion of their curriculum and are no longer at the Health Department.
