### Voters Can Check Election and Voter Registration Information

Wisconsin voters can check election and voter registration information on the Internet using the State's website at <http://www.elections.wi.gov> under Voter Information.

This will allow you to check whether or not you are registered to vote in Brown Deer, and where your polling place is. You simply type in your name and date of birth, or you can search by entering your complete address.

The Voter Public Access site provides three basic types of information:

- Voter Registration information.
- Polling place information and lists of offices and officeholders for whom voters at a particular address can vote.
- Provisional ballot status for voters who have cast a provisional ballot.

When entering information, voters may occasionally encounter prompts concerning spelling changes or other information that must be double-checked or re-entered, such as the difference between "38th Street" and "Thirty-Eighth Street". There is an instruction page to help navigate the site.

Prior to each election, an electronic sample ballot for Brown Deer may also be available on the site so the voter can review the offices and officeholders who will appear on the ballot.

Voters who find information about officeholders missing in Voter Public Access should contact the clerk's office, which is responsible for updating that information.

As you will note, this headline is in text language and is a sign of the modern changes in the ever-changing world of communication. Some of you will remember the days of *The Brown Deer Herald* when you could get a weekly report of the Village activities. This publication evolved into the *North Shore Now* which not only covers Brown Deer, but all of the other North Shore communities and Mequon and Thiensville. I am sure you have noticed that the coverage of Brown Deer occurs on a much more limited basis.



The Village continues to use this newsletter as a form of communication. Initially, this newsletter was prepared quarterly, but was reduced to three times a year to help save costs. The Village also consolidated the newsletter into one publication which contains both Village news and the program offerings from the Park and Recreation Department. While the newsletter is good for providing important information, it may not be as timely since it is sent only three times a year.

In an effort to provide current information on a regular basis, the Village updated its official website, [www.browndeerwi.org](http://www.browndeerwi.org). If you haven't visited this website, I encourage you to do so. The website also offers many features, including an interactive calendar and the ability to conduct interactive surveys of various topics. We update or change the surveys periodically and we are constantly updating the current news, so visit the website frequently.

Another new feature of the website is the Citizen Request Management Center (CRM). This online service will allow you to notify village officials of potential problems, concerns or areas of improvement. Furthermore, it will allow you to track your request as it is being reviewed and addressed.

On our website you can also sign up to receive a weekly newsletter about all of the activities within the Village government. This newsletter, called the Brown Deer Tracker, is archived on our website and distributed to those who sign up to receive it electronically. For those of you without access to internet or email, paper copies of the "Brown Deer Tracker" are available at the Village Hall, Library, and the Senior Citizen Center. The Brown Deer Tracker is the best way to stay current on all of the departmental activities.

Recently, the Village helped launch a new community website called [OurBrownDeer.com](http://OurBrownDeer.com). "OurBrownDeer.com" is a social networking site that enables Brown Deer businesses and civic organizations to join as members, and add their business listings, events, and photos to the site. Residents of Brown Deer are also invited to join and create personal pages on the site. The site is based on a platform which operates much like Facebook, but was customized for Brown Deer. Members can even post messages on their own personal pages, or on each other's pages, and sign each other up as friends. People are already adding to the site, so get on board, register and add information. The goal is to make the site attractive and encourage residents to use it as their personal home page.

In addition to these websites, you can also become a fan of the The Village of Brown Deer on Facebook and follow "browndeerwi" on Twitter. Currently, Facebook has more than 250 million users and more than 23 million people use Twitter. These social media outlets are changing the way governments communicate to its residents.

## 2010 Village of Brown Deer Revaluation Update

The fieldwork necessary to complete the 2010 revaluation has started. The assessor will not be coming into homes, but will be reviewing sales of comparable properties within Brown Deer.

The State of Wisconsin state statues require that all property owners be notified if there is a change in the assessed value of their property. Notices should be sent out in mid-August.

If you disagree with the value assigned by the assessor, you can schedule a meeting with the assessor. During this informal session, the assessor will explain how your assessment was made, view the record for your property, what factors were considered in determining a value for your property, and view comparable house values. The Open Book process is scheduled for September 1 and 2, 2010.

If after that meeting you still disagree with the assessor, you can arrange to appear before the Board of Review (a citizen

committee who hears cases in a formal setting). To appear before the Board of Review, you will be required to complete an objection form, which must be completed in full. You will then be scheduled for a hearing where you will present your case regarding the assessed value of your property. The Board of Review is scheduled for September 22, 2010.

# Brown Deer Police Department



With the warm weather months approaching, the Brown Deer Police Department would like to remind residents of the following Village Ordinances:

**34-156: NOISES PROHIBITED:** Sound from radios, stereos, boom boxes, and similar devices whether from a residence or a motor vehicle is prohibited if the sound is plainly audible to any person other than the person listening to it or if it is plainly audible at a distance of 50 feet by any person in a public area.



**121-327(2): TEMPORARY SIGNS:**

Garage/Yard Sale Signs: No signs shall be attached or placed on a building, structure, tree, public right-of-way or grounds that are owned, operated or maintained by any public agency or private utility; and no person shall place any notice upon any building, fence or other property of another without written permission. Signs shall be set back a minimum of five feet from any lot line. Such signs are not allowed on any commercial property. The maximum time limit for all residential sale signs is three consecutive days and nine cumulative days in a one year period.



Real Estate Signs: There shall be not more than one real estate sign for

each property except where a property abuts two or more streets, in which case an additional sign may be allowed if located on a separate abutting street frontage. Such signs shall be set back a minimum of five feet from any lot line. Such signs shall be removed within 30 days of the sale, rental or lease. Such signs may not be displayed for a period longer than 180 consecutive days.

Political Signs: There shall not be more than one sign per candidate or public policy issue for each lot, except where a lot abuts two or more streets, in which case an additional sign may be allowed if located on a separate abutting street frontage. Such signs shall be set back a minimum of five feet from any lot line. No signs shall be attached or placed on a building, structure, tree, public right-of-way or grounds that are owned, operated or maintained by any public agency or private utility; and no person shall place any notice upon any building, wall, fence or other property of another without written permission.

**38-3(4): PUBLIC HEALTH NUISANCES: (UNCUT GRASS & NOXIOUS WEEDS):**

Noxious Weeds: A person owning, occupying or controlling land shall destroy all noxious weeds on the property.

Uncut Grass: All lawn, turf or grass shall be maintained to a height not to exceed eight inches. Said regulation shall not apply to any natural lawn or land managed to preserve or restore native Wisconsin grasses, forbs, trees, shrubs, wildflowers or aquatic plants.

**20-1: FIRE CODE: (OPEN BURNING/OUTDOOR BURNING):**

Small bonfires for cooking, or recreation are allowed provided that the fire is contained by a control device, structure or other device specifically designed for that use such as a fire pit, masonry barbeque pit, chimenea or similar device or as approved by the municipality and the fire department. The maximum open burn area is 33 inches in diameter or six square feet. All of the above must have a screen to prevent sparks from becoming readily airborne and a cover which fits and encloses the entire opening to ensure all hot embers are confined. Open burning of weeds or brush is prohibited within the village.



**34-202: CURFEW FOR MINORS:** Curfew hours are from 11:00 p.m. through 6:00 a.m. of each day and are in effect for minors under the age of 18. It shall be unlawful for a minor, during curfew hours, to remain in or upon any public place with the Village, to remain in any motor vehicle operating or parked therein or thereon, or to remain in or upon the premises of any establishment within the Village, unless:

- (1) The minor is accompanied by a parent; or,
- (2) The minor is involved in an emergency; or,
- (3) The minor is engaged in an employment activity, or is going to or returning home from such activity, without detour or stop; or,
- (4) The minor is on the sidewalk directly abutting a place where he/she resides; or,
- (5) The minor is attending an activity sponsored by a school, religious, or civic organization, which is supervised by adults, and/or the minor is going to or returning from such an activity without detour or stop; or,
- (6) The minor is on an errand at the direction of a parent, and has in his/her possession a writing signed by the parent including the following; name, signature, address and telephone number of the parent authorizing the errand, where the parent can be reached during the errand, name of the minor, brief description of the errand, minor's destination(s) and date and hours the minor is authorized to engage in the errand; or,



- (7) The minor, with parent's knowledge and consent, is involved in interstate travel through or beginning or terminating in the Village.

## Grilling Safety

According to the NFPA (National Fire Protection Association), in 2003–2006, U.S. Fire Departments responded to an average of 7,900 home fires involving grills, hibachis or barbecues per year, including an average of 2,900 structure fires and 5,000 outside fires. These 7,900 fires caused an annual average of 10 civilian deaths (to the nearest ten), 120 reported injuries and \$80 million in direct property damage. The following safety tips will help you and your family enjoy a safe, memorable grilling season...

- Position the grill well away from siding, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Place the grill a safe distance from lawn games, play areas and foot traffic.
- Keep children and pets away from the grill area: declare a three-foot "safe zone" around the grill.
- Put out several long-handled grilling tools to give the chef plenty of clearance from heat and flames when flipping burgers.
- Periodically remove grease or fat build-up in trays below grill so it cannot be ignited by a hot grill.
- Grill should be positioned 10 ft. from roadway and building/house structures.
- Do not grill underneath tarps or tents.

### Gas Grills

Check the gas cylinder hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. A light soap and water solution applied to the hose will quickly reveal escaping propane by releasing bubbles. If you determine your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame:

- Turn off the gas tank and grill.
- If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again.
- If the leak does not stop, call the fire department.
- If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not attempt to move the grill.
- All gas cylinders manufactured after April 2002 must have overfill protection devices (OPD). OPDs shut off the flow of gas

before capacity is reached, limiting the potential for release of propane gas if the cylinder heats up. OPDs are easily identified by their triangular-shaped hand wheel.

- Use only equipment bearing the mark of an independent testing laboratory. Follow the manufacturers' instructions on how to set up the grill and maintain it.
- Never store propane gas cylinders in buildings or garages. If you store a gas grill inside during the winter, disconnect the cylinder and leave it outside.
- When using a gas cylinder larger than 20 lbs. chain it to something stable to prevent it from tipping over.

### Charcoal Grilling

- If you are using fluid to start a charcoal grill, use only fluid intended for this purpose. It is extremely dangerous to substitute any other combustible liquid to start the coals. This is especially true for gasoline, which can be ignited explosively by even a tiny spark.
- Apply starter fluid directly to the coals, then reseal and put away the can. Light the coals carefully, avoiding the flame flare-up. Store the can out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- When you've finished cooking, keep an eye on the grill until it has completely cooled. Charcoal can be soaked with water to speed the cooling process, but use extreme caution to avoid the steam and splatters, which can cause burns.

Grilling on decks and patios poses a fire hazard. The 2009 edition of NFPA 1 applies to, and is enforced in, the North Shore Communities:

**10.11.6 For other than one- and two-family dwellings, no hibachi, grill, or other similar devices used for cooking, heating, or any other purpose shall be used or kindled on any balcony, under any overhanging portion, or within 10 ft. (3 m) of any structure.**

## Prescription Drugs and your Kids

It can be medication left over from your last surgery. Maybe they're the pills you keep on the dresser or tucked inside your purse. Teens are finding prescription drugs wherever people they know keep them, and abusing them to get high. In fact, 70 percent of persons age 12 and older who abuse prescription painkillers say they get them from a relative or friend—leading to several troubling trends:

- Every day, more than 2,000 kids age 12 to 17 try a painkiller non-medically for the first time.
- Teens abuse prescription drugs more than any illicit street drug except marijuana.
- Drug treatment admissions for prescription painkillers increased more than 300 percent from 1996 to 2006.

What's also disturbing is they don't realize these drugs can be just

as dangerous as street drugs. So kids who would never try street drugs might feel safe abusing prescription drugs. Misperceptions about prescription drug abuse have serious consequences. Now that you know prescription drug abuse is a problem, here are ways parents can keep it from affecting their kids' lives:

- Safeguard all drugs at home. Monitor quantities and control access.
- Set clear rules for teens about all drug use, including not sharing medicine and always following the medical provider's advice and dosages.
- Be a good role model by following the same rules with your own medicines.
- Properly dispose of old or unneeded medicines. Plan to regularly clean out medicine cabinets. Contact the Brown Deer Police Department to learn more about our collection program.
- Ask friends and family to safeguard their prescription drugs as well.

## 2009 Water Quality Report

### About Brown Deer's Water

Brown Deer purchases its water from the City of Milwaukee. The source of our drinking water is Lake Michigan. It is treated at the Linnwood Water Treatment Plant. Water travels through a network of 65 miles of underground mains to your home. Although we purchase our water wholesale from Milwaukee, the Brown Deer Water Utility controls its distribution once it enters Brown Deer.

Lake Michigan is a surface water source. Contaminants would be expected in untreated surface water. As water flows through rivers, lakes and over land, naturally occurring substances dissolve in the water. Animal and/or human activities can also affect the water. These substances are called contaminants. Surface water sources may be highly susceptible to contaminants. Contaminants that might be expected in untreated water include: inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals; biological contaminants, such as viruses, protozoa and bacteria; organic chemicals from industrial or petroleum use; pesticides and herbicides; and radioactive materials.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. Milwaukee Water Works (MWW) aggressively tests and monitors its drinking water in an effort to protect public health. MWW provides drinking water of the finest quality to 823,000 people in 14 communities. Their water meets standards more stringent than federal and state water quality requirements.

### Cryptosporidium

*Cryptosporidium* is a microscopic protozoan that, when ingested, can result in diarrhea, fever, and other gastrointestinal symptoms. The Milwaukee Health Department and the Milwaukee Water Works have tested both raw and treated drinking water for *Cryptosporidium* since 1993. The organism is found in many surface water sources and comes from animal wastes in the watershed. *Cryptosporidium* is eliminated by an effective treatment combination including ozonation, coagulation, sedimentation, filtration and disinfection.

### Lead and Copper

Brown Deer has no lead mains or service lines, which helps protect Village residents from a possible source of lead contamination. Corrosion of home plumbing causes copper and lead to enter the drinking water. Since 1995, none of the homes sampled in Brown Deer has tested above the action level of 15 parts per billion of lead and 1300 parts per billion of copper.

Infants and young children are typically more vulnerable to the effects of lead and copper in drinking water. Flush your faucet for at least 30 seconds before using tap water to help reduce lead and copper that may have entered water standing in your plumbing. If you are concerned about elevated lead and copper levels in your home's water you may wish to have your water tested by a local certified lab. In addition to Lead and Copper sampling, the Brown Deer Water Utility also takes several monthly water samples to check chlorine levels and check for the presence of bacteria.

### Immuno-Compromised Persons

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons, such as persons undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly persons and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their healthcare providers. Additional information is available from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) (<http://www.cdc.gov>).

### Pharmaceutical & Personal Care Products

Milwaukee Water Works expanded its water quality testing to include organisms & contaminants not yet regulated but considered an "emerging concern". These included endocrine disrupting & pharmaceutical personal care products. Ozone, the primary disinfectant MWW uses in water treatment has been shown to destroy many of these compounds. None of the items tested for were detected in Milwaukee's drinking water. More information is available at <http://water.mpw.net/3faqsquality.htm>.

### Hydrant Flushing

The Utility will be flushing hydrants again in 2010. Called "uni-directional flushing", it involves operating system valves, as well as the fire hydrants. The process helps clean mains and brings fresher water into the neighborhood. We will start the "Big Flush" early this summer. After you see us in your area you may want to clean your private water lateral and plumbing by flushing all plumbing fixtures, cleaning faucet screens and inspecting your plumbing for leaks.

**Trihalomethanes:** Chloroform, bromochloromethane, dibromochloromethane and bromoform.

## General Information

The Village of Brown Deer Park and Recreation Department is responsible for the development and operation of recreation programs and park facilities in Brown Deer. Department policies and procedures are governed by the Brown Deer Park and Recreation Committee. Committee meetings are held on the first Tuesday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Village Hall. Meetings are open to the public.

The Department office is located in the Lower Level of the Village Hall at 4800 W. Green Brook Drive. **Office hours are 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. The office telephone is (414) 371-3070.**

## Registration

Complete the registration form on page 10 and include payment in the form of cash or check payable to the Village of Brown Deer.

**Resident registrations received by mail or drop box** will be processed in the order received. The drop box is located in front of Village Hall at the east end of the circle drive. **Nonresident registrations** will be accepted beginning **Monday, May 3.**

**REGISTER EARLY!** If a program does not meet its minimum registration requirement within five days of the start, the program may be cancelled.

## Residency Policy

Individuals who live in the Village of Brown Deer and students who attend Brown Deer schools may register for department programs as residents. **2010 Resident I.D. cards** may be obtained in the Park and Recreation Department during office hours or from the Village Hall receptionist.

## Fees and Refunds Policy

The program fees are established to recover the direct operational costs of each facility and program. All fees must be paid at the time of registration. Fees will not be prorated for individuals who are unable to attend all sessions of a program.

Full refunds will be issued if a program is cancelled or changed by the Park and Recreation Department. When a single program session is cancelled due to weather or change in facility availability, no refunds will be issued.

Full or partial refunds of instructional and membership fees will be issued only in situations when an individual or family is unable to participate because of a medical condition, change in schedule, or unusual circumstance. Full or partial refunds of instructional and membership fees will be subject to a 20% administrative fee.



## PROGRAM POLICIES

**INCLEMENT WEATHER**—No programs will be held when the schools are closed due to inclement weather. Telephone **(414) 371-3071** for cancellations. The information will be prerecorded.

**INSURANCE**—The Park and Recreation Department does not provide hospital or medical insurance coverage for individuals who participate in sponsored programs. Participants are advised to obtain their own insurance coverage prior to registration in any program.

**PHYSICIAN REFERRAL**—Participants, who are over 40 years of age or who have health problems, are advised to consult a physician prior to registration in adult fitness programs.

**PHOTOGRAPHS**—For program promotion purposes, photographs may be taken of participants during a program. If you do not want your or your child's photograph taken, please advise the class instructor.

**CHILD CARE**—Child care is not provided for adult programs. Children are not permitted to attend adult programs without supervision of another adult who is not actively participating in the activity.

**PROGRAM CONFIRMATIONS**—Confirmations will not be sent. Assume you are enrolled and plan to attend unless otherwise notified.

**WAITING LISTS**—The Park and Recreation Department will make every effort to accommodate individuals on waiting lists. If an opening becomes available, you will be contacted by telephone.

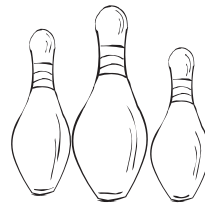

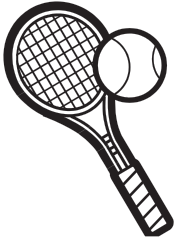

The Ozaukee Interurban Trail is a 30-mile paved trail that spans the entire length of Ozaukee County and connects to the south through the Brown Deer Recreational Trail with the Milwaukee County Oak Leaf Trail.
