### **Activity Report:**

During the month of August the Brown Deer Police Department responded to 1164 calls for service, issued 223 traffic citations, 72 parking citations and made 69 non-traffic related arrests/citations. Overall activity level was slightly less when compared with the prior year.


### **Chief's Report**

The Department began training officers in the use of low lethal impact projectiles and has deployed the necessary equipment throughout the Department. These projectiles provide another alternative for officers when dealing with combative or resistive individuals in high risk situations.


In an effort to reduce traffic crashes and bring attention to traffic concerns the Department has implemented High Visibility Traffic Enforcement (HVTE) at various locations throughout the Village. The locations and times of HVTE details are announced via our Twitter account and the results of our efforts are announced later in the day. Several details were accomplished in late August near the schools in an effort to bring awareness to school's opening and reduce the speeds in school zones.

PD staff met with School staff and discussed the upcoming school year. Due to policing priorities the PD has reduced the number of School Liaison Officers (SLO) to one for this school year. This is reflected in the graph on page seven of this report. The reduction of an SLO will allow an investigator to concentrate on other crimes, primarily illegal drug activity.


### 2014/2015 Year to Date Calls for Service




### 2014/2015 Year to Date Enforcement Action (arrests, citations & warnings)

August 2014/2015**




## August 2015 Allocation of Police Services



General Calls for Service – Complaints that typically do not require a police report and/or those that occur infrequently enough that they can't be assigned to one of the listed categories. Examples would be disabled vehicles, death investigations, code violations, etc.


Thefts – Includes Retail Thefts which account for approximately 55% of the total theft complaints.


### North Shore Reported Incidents by Jurisdiction

The Department has one Investigator that also serves as a School Liaison Officers (SLO). The above graph depicts the percentage of time the SLO's spend performing the various duties assigned to them.

SLO Presence – Time the officers were physically present in the school (includes time instructing DARE).

School Related – Time spent on school related investigations/reports where the officer was not physically present at the school.
