

WILEAG ACCREDITATION


The Brown Deer Police Department continues its membership in the Wisconsin Law Enforcement Accreditation Group (WILEAG). This program is voluntary and is an ongoing process enabling law enforcement agencies to evaluate, strengthen, improve and maintain their effectiveness. It works on a process of self-evaluation, keeping law enforcement activities, procedures and goals in check.

The accreditation process requires the department to have numerous policies in place and several standards met for each policy. It requires a continual review of all the department functions and operations and evaluation of the existing policies for required elements, as well as creating any new policies as needed. It is repeated every three years (re-accreditation) and requires a combined effort from the entire department in order to be successful. The Brown Deer Police Department first became accredited in February 2009 and plans to complete our re-accreditation in the Spring of 2015.

Accreditation offers the Brown Deer Police Department several benefits: Providing “norms” against which agency performance can be monitored and measured over time; increased cooperation and coordination with other law enforcement agencies; increased effectiveness and efficiency in the delivery of law enforcement services; and demonstrating to the community that the Brown Deer Police Department possesses the professionalism it wants and deserves.



CRIME STATISTICS



In 2011 the Brown Deer Police Department made the switch from Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) to the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS or IBR). This was made as a result of a nationwide push from the FBI to implement IBR.

THE MAIN DIFFERENCES?

The NIBRS has much more detail in its reporting system than the traditional summary reporting system (UCR). NIBRS collects offense information on 46 crimes, whereas the summary system collects information on eight crimes.

In the summary reporting system, the "Hierarchy Rule" governs multiple offense reporting. This means if more than one crime was committed by the same person or group of persons and the times and space intervals separating the crimes were insignificant, then the crime highest in the hierarchs is the only offense reported. In NIBRS, all of the crimes are reported as offenses within the same incident.

Because of these and other minor changes, it was difficult to compare UCR statistics to IBR statistics, which is why the department chose to wait to publish these statistics until a full three years of data was available from IBR.



Patrol Services 2013

The goal of the Brown Deer Police Department is to provide a high standard of professional services. Patrol Officers handle calls that range from domestic problems, neighbor problems, noise violations, parking violations to suicidal persons and robberies. Patrol Officers are responsible for the initial investigation of all calls and many times, depending on the nature of the call, all the necessary follow up in order to clear it. Patrol Officers are also responsible for traffic enforcement, accident investigations, business checks and many other duties.

The following is a list of activities that were initiated by or assigned to the officers. *This activity only includes officers assigned to patrol. It does not include that of the investigative bureau.*

CRASH FATALITIES

In 2013 there were no traffic crashes resulting in a fatality.

TRAFFIC VIOLATIONS CITED IN CRASHES

Citations were issued for violation of traffic laws in 100 of 185 traffic crash investigations which is about 54% of the investigations. 1 citation was issued per crash investigation in which a citation was issued.

MOST FREQUENT TIMES FOR CRASHES


Traffic crashes most frequently occurred in Brown Deer between the hours of 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. During these hours there were a total of 146 crashes or 79% of the total crashes for 2013.

During these hours crashes most frequently occurred between 12:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. In this time period there were 89 crashes or 48% of the total crashes for 2013.

The hour from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 a.m. had the single most crashes during 2013 with 19 crashes. 10% of the total crashes for 2013 occurred during this time period.

The days with the most frequent rate of crashes were Monday, Thursday, and Friday. Those days accounted for 102 crashes or 55% of the total crashes for 2013.

INVESTIGATIVE BUREAU

The Brown Deer Police Department Investigative Bureau and Youth Services Bureau were involved in several investigations during 2013.

ATTEMPTED HOMICIDE:

In January 2013, Officers and Investigative Bureau personnel responded to the Brooklane Apartments for a 911 call. The caller had been stabbed multiple times by an ex-boyfriend. He also pointed a gun at her. The suspect was arrested on scene. A great deal of evidence was gathered including evidence from the scene, evidence from a search warrant at the suspect's home in Milwaukee, as well as data from electronic devices. An investigation indicated the suspect likely did this to prevent the victim and her mother from reporting a fraud to the police. It was determined that he was the suspect in that fraud and he learned they were going to the police department on the day of the attack. The suspect was charged with Substantial Battery, 1st-Degree Intentional Homicide- Attempt, 1st-Degree Reckless Injury, Intentionally Point Firearm at Person, and Theft. The suspect pled guilty to 1st-Degree Reckless Injury and was sentenced to 30 years in prison.

SEXUAL ASSAULTS/SEXUALLY EXPLICIT MATERIAL:

In April 2013, the Investigative Bureau was asked to assist in the investigation of a six year old that reported to have been sexually assaulted by a 13 year old relative. After interviews and examinations were conducted it was determined the case could not be substantiated. Investigators and the Bureau of Milwaukee Child Welfare worked together to ensure the safety of the child victim.

In May 2013, Officer Guenette investigated two instances within the schools of students sending sexually inappropriate photos via messages on their phones or electronic devices. Search warrants and consent to search were obtained for various phones or devices. After investigations were conducted, four juveniles were referred to Milwaukee County Children's Court Center.

In June 2013, Officer Fus assisted in the investigation of a massage therapist who worked in Brown Deer. During a session he reportedly rubbed the genital area of a female patient without her consent. The suspect was arrested and interviewed. After review by the Milwaukee County District Attorney's Office, no charges were issued against the suspect.

In July 2013, Investigative Bureau personnel became involved in investigating numerous sex offenses committed by an adult male Brown Deer resident against numerous juvenile males. The suspect was formerly a teacher with Milwaukee Public Schools, and then the principal at the YMCA Young Leaders Academy and was involved in the YMCA Youth Leadership Academy. The victims were people that he met in these various schools or programs. After speaking with the subjects that initially reported the offenses, a search warrant was conducted at the suspect's Brown Deer residence. A great deal of evidence was obtained, including information that led Investigators to speak with other subjects who were also determined to be victims. The suspect was charged with 23 offenses including 10 counts of 1st-Degree Sexual Assault of a Child, five counts of 2nd-Degree Sexual Assault of a Child, two counts of 3rd-Degree Sexual Assault of a Child, three counts of Exposing Genitals to a Child, two counts of Repeated Acts of Sexual

Assault Against the Same Child, and one count of Child Enticement to Expose Sex Organ. There were additional victims whose cases could not be pursued because the offenses occurred outside of the statute of limitations. All of the offenses occurred over a number of years back to the 1980's and occurred in the suspect's residence in Brown Deer as well as his previous addresses in Milwaukee. Additional charges were expected to be issued in January 2014. These charges were not issued and all of the above charges were dismissed after the suspect died in December 2013.

In October 2013, Sergeant Koeppel became involved in the investigation into the sexual assault of a four year old child. The suspect was a 16 year old relative. Interviews and examinations were conducted using Children's Hospital of Wisconsin- Child Protection Center. The 16 year old was taken into custody and admitted to having sexually inappropriate conduct with the child. The suspect was transported to Children's Court Center and was charged with 1st-Degree Sexual Assault of a Child.

In December 2013, Officer Fus assisted in the investigation into a sexual assault that was reportedly committed against a developmentally disabled Brown Deer resident by another developmentally disabled Milwaukee resident. Both victim and suspect were adults. Forensic interviews were conducted with the assistance of Children's Hospital of Wisconsin – Child Protection Center. After the District Attorney's Office reviewed the case, no charges were issued.

CHILD ABUSE:

In February 2013, Officer Fus investigated the physical abuse of a four year old by her mother. The mother hit the child in the face with a fist and a belt. The child had marks on her face and the marks were parallel to each other and then looped together on one end which is consistent with a strike from a belt. The mother was arrested and charged with a felony of Child Abuse-Recklessly Cause Harm.

BURGLARIES:

In April 2013, a burglary was committed at a Brown Deer residence while the victim was home. Stolen were a laptop and an iPad. The iPad was later sold at a pawn shop in Milwaukee. Investigators recovered the stolen iPad and obtained information on the people that sold it including an inked fingerprint the pawn shop is required to get which led to the identification of one suspect. Investigators worked with the Milwaukee Police Department Fusion Center to identify the second suspect. Phone records were obtained for the suspects, including cellular phone tower data. This data put them at the scene of the burglary and then at the pawn shop. One suspect was arrested shortly after for committing a burglary in the City of Milwaukee. Brown Deer Investigators later located the second suspect who was placed under arrest and confessed to being the getaway driver. Both suspects were charged with burglary and are currently awaiting disposition of their cases.

In July 2013, Investigators assisted in investigating a burglary to the Shell gas station located on West Bradley Rd. A suspect has been identified; a search warrant was conducted at a residence in the City of Milwaukee. Evidence is still being processed by the State of Wisconsin Crime Laboratory.

DRUG INVESTIGATION:

In February 2013, the Brown Deer School District requested a police K9 drug search at the schools. As a result numerous agencies provided assistance with the use of the K9's and police officer handlers. As a result of this K9 search, a K9 hit on a student's vehicle and marijuana and drug paraphernalia were located during a search. The student was arrested and issued a citation.

In July 2013, Investigators were called in while off duty to assist third shift officers in a drug investigation. Third shift officers responded to a 911 hang up call at a residence. Upon arriving, they were told that there was nobody else inside besides the person who came to the door despite officers being able to see there were other people inside. Additionally, officers were able to smell marijuana, freshly burnt marijuana, and one subject admitted to being high. Officers entered and secured the residence to protect evidence and observed drugs, paraphernalia, and cutting agents used to manufacture drugs in plain view. They therefore asked for Investigators' assistance. A search warrant was obtained to search the entire residence. During the search warrant, heroin was located in the residence as was marijuana, cocaine, and prescription medication. One subject that was inside was charged with possession of heroin and was sentenced to a year in the House of Corrections. A second suspect, who resided there, was not charged, but the information was included in a 2012 criminal case he had pending for possession of heroin with intent to distribute.

ROBBERIES:

In August 2013, a male Brown Deer resident met a female subject who was a prostitute and allowed her and another male into his residence. Once inside the residence and when the Brown Deer male was in a compromising position, they committed an armed robbery against him. The suspects were identified with the help of probation officers, escort internet advertisements, and Potawatomi Casino security. The two suspects were later arrested by the Milwaukee Police Department related to their Human Trafficking (prostitution) activities. Officer Rooney interviewed them and the female admitted to being at the victim's residence, but the male would not provide officers with any useful information. Both were charged with Armed Robbery and the male was also charged with Pimping/Pandering. Both of the cases are still ongoing in the court system.

In December 2013, the Investigative Bureau conducted investigations into two armed robberies that occurred at the BP gas station on separate days. A possible suspect has been identified in one of the cases. Both robberies are still being investigated.

WEAPONS VIOLATIONS:

In January 2013, an investigation was conducted by Officer Fus into a report that a student brought a gun to school. One student reported to a teacher that another student had brought a gun into the building. As a result of this report, the school went into a lockdown and the student that supposedly had the gun was searched and interviewed. After an investigation was conducted, it was determined the reporting student had made this up. The reporting student was arrested for Disorderly Conduct and charged by the District Attorney's Office for the same.

In February 2013, Officer Fus learned that a student brought a gun to the basketball game the previous weekend. The student was in and out of the school during the game. The student had discarded the gun in a construction pile for a while during his attendance at the game. When interviewed, the student stated he brought a BB gun to school during the basketball game. The BB gun was recovered at a residence. The student was arrested and referred to the Milwaukee County Children's Court Center.

DEATH INVESTIGATION:

Officer Rooney and Sergeant Koeppel continued investigating the 2011 death of a 17 year old from a heroin overdose. Numerous leads have been explored but no suspects were identified that caused the death.

In May 2013, Investigators assisted in a missing person investigation. The missing subject, an adult Milwaukee resident worked at Papa John's in Brown Deer. The missing man never arrived home after work and never made his last pizza deliveries. Investigators utilized multiple resources in an attempt to locate the man. Later a body was located at Noyes Park and it was determined that the missing subject died in the City of Milwaukee. Information was turned over to the Milwaukee Police Department.

In December 2013, an investigation was conducted into a fire at a residence in Brown Deer. The adult male resident who was a suspect in numerous sexual assaults was found deceased inside the residence. Investigators continue to work with the Medical Examiner's Office and Fire Marshall reference this investigation which is ongoing.

FRAUD:

In October 2012, Officer Fus and Officer Rooney assisted patrol officers with a fraud investigation where two subjects were arrested on-scene. Subjects were opening fraudulent credit card accounts with names of people from other states. The subjects opened accounts at several locations in Wisconsin and some other states. A total of more than \$20,000.00 of miscellaneous merchandise that was fraudulently purchased was recovered during the arrest. Officer Rooney continued follow-up into 2013. The case is pending in the Federal Court system.

In April 2013, Officer Rooney assisted in investigating the theft of money from an elderly woman. She was told to withdraw money from her bank by someone posing as a bank employee and then to meet him and turn the money over to him so he could conduct a bank investigation. Officer Rooney continues to investigate this matter.

TRUANCY:

Over 50 students were issued municipal citations for truancy. Seven parents were counseled and issued citations for contributing to truancy. Some families and even individual students were involved in truancy violations multiple times. Many more were investigated and counselled.

BACKGROUND INVESTIGATIONS

Throughout the year, Investigative Bureau personnel completed 56 background investigations. These included background investigations for officers or other future employees of the police

department. This also includes background investigations for other people seeking employment in and through the Village Hall or volunteering in the community.

JUVENILES/PARENTS COUNSELED:

Investigative Bureau personnel counseled juveniles or their parents approximately 346 times as a result of their roles within the schools or involvement with the youth of the community.

TRAFFIC STOPS:

Investigative Bureau personnel conducted a total of nine traffic stops and issued five citations and four warnings.

COURT LIAISON DUTIES:

The Investigative Bureau is responsible for taking cases to the Milwaukee County District Attorney's Office for charging determinations, as well as obtaining subpoenas and search warrants to gather further evidence in investigations. During 2013, the Investigative Bureau took approximately 511 cases, subpoenas, or search warrants to the District Attorney's Office or Circuit Court.

Youth Services – 2013

Officers Mark Rooney, Brian Guenette, and Melissa Fus worked with the youth of the community throughout 2013.

Officer Mark Rooney served as the Youth Services Officer. Officer Rooney is responsible for administering the Second Chance program. This program allows first-time offenders who display an attitude of contrition and a willingness to change their behavior, to have their citation dismissed. The program consists of two classes, community service work, writing an essay, and paying a fee. One class is presented by an ex-convict who speaks about his life, his choices, and the consequences of those choices. The second class covers drug and alcohol awareness, self-responsibility, choices and consequences, and identifying something in their lives to get involved in. Officer Rooney also is responsible for referring cases to the Children's Court Center or other agencies, preparing all juvenile cases for filing, maintaining juvenile files, and investigating serious juvenile offenses that occur outside the schools. Officer Rooney is responsible for purchasing and maintaining crime scene investigation equipment and evidence collection materials. Officer Rooney coordinates registering sex offenders and maintains those records. Officer Rooney also handles investigation of criminal activity as it relates to voter fraud. Officer Rooney works out of the Investigative Bureau as an investigator and evidence technician for criminal investigations, as well as a Circuit Court liaison officer.

Officer Brian Guenette served as a School Liaison Officer at the Brown Deer Middle School and later at the Brown Deer Elementary School. Officer Guenette is responsible for investigating criminal complaints as well as ordinance violations within the Brown Deer School District. Officer Guenette also taught the D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) curriculum to the fifth grade students at the Brown Deer Middle School. Officer Guenette taught about 120 students during this time period and organized a graduation for the students in May 2013. In May 2013, Officer Guenette and Officer Caddock conducted a school wide assembly on bicycle and summer school at the Dean Elementary School. Officer Guenette participated in the department's Citizens' Police Academy. Officer Guenette is the department's Radar/Laser trainer, as well as the NARK II (drug test kit) trainer. Officer Guenette also worked out of the Investigative Bureau as an investigator and evidence technician for criminal investigations, as well as a Circuit Court liaison officer.

Officer Melissa Fus served as a School Liaison Officer at the Brown Deer High School and later at the Brown Deer Middle/High School. Officer Fus is responsible for investigating criminal complaints as well as ordinance violations within the Brown Deer School District. At the beginning of the school year, Officer Fus and the School Administration met with each student class and provided information regarding law violations and expectations in the school. This information was also presented at a later time in more detail to the Freshman Health classes. Officer Fus would present on a variety of topics which included: internet safety, ordinance violations, law violations, and current issues affecting youth today. Officer Fus continues to plan the Forever Changed

program to bring it to the Brown Deer School District in future years. Officer Fus met with Administrators at the Brown Deer School District to revise and update the School District's Truancy/Attendance Policy, to discuss discipline issues, and also the School Emergency Procedures. She also assisted in identifying security concerns as the new Brown Deer Middle/High School was being built. Officer Fus assisted in revising and updating various departmental policies. Officer Fus also maintains and updates the Juvenile Offender List, school maps and emergency plans for the command post/trailer, and also a Counterfeit Money Tracking log. Officer Fus works out of the Investigative Bureau as an investigator and evidence technician for criminal investigations, as well as a Circuit Court liaison officer. Officer Fus is a member of the Wisconsin School Resource Officer's Association and the National School Resource Officer's Association.

Officer Guenette, Officer Fus, and Officer Rooney attended all home boys' varsity football and basketball games as well as prom and homecoming dances.

CRIME PREVENTION

As Brown Deer's Crime Prevention Officer, Brad Caddock participates in a variety of groups and organizations that keep him current with the latest security practices. Some of the organizations include: American Society for Industrial Security; Inter-County Association of Crime Prevention Practitioners; North Shore Crime Stoppers; Wisconsin Burglary and Fire Alarm Association and the Wisconsin Crime Prevention Practitioners.

Officer Caddock undertakes assignments and participates in a variety of events throughout the year. In 2013 some of his activities included the quarterly meeting of the Brown Deer Neighborhood Watch; organizing the Brown Deer's Night Out for Justice event; a realtor expo and monthly meetings with the managers of Brooklane Deer Run, Deerwood Crossing and Green Court Apartments to discuss activities at their respective complexes. Officer Caddock also attends many area business meetings with their employees to discuss emergency operation plans, personal safety issues and various crime prevention tips. He also represents the department at numerous apartment complex and condo association meetings throughout the year.

As part of his duties in Crime Prevention, Officer Caddock regularly reviews proposals sent through the Community Services Department for new and updated businesses in the Village. He also regularly reviews plans for commercial and residential developments as part of his assignment. Officer Caddock has worked with businesses and property owners in Brown Deer throughout the year to offer and/or implement plans to reduce the level of calls for service originating from them.

Officer Caddock monitors crime trends to assist in implementing programs and procedures to reduce and/or lessen the losses caused by crime. He provides a variety of services to the community and has a repertoire of presentations that include, but are not limited to the following: residential and commercial security surveys; child identification prints; robbery prevention techniques; credit card fraud; internet safety, travel and personal safety and youth safety programs.



K-9 UNIT



Brown Deer Police K-9 Unit



Vader is a Belgian Malinois, born in July of 2011. Vader is a patrol dog trained in narcotics detection, apprehension and handler protection, tracking, and building searches. Vader and Officer Morgan received their training from DeMeaux Malinois Kennels in conjunction with Drexler School for Dogs, both located in Indiana.

Officer Morgan and Vader train on a regular basis to ensure proficiency, including a full day of training at least once per month with other K-9 teams from the Milwaukee metro area, as well as annual certification and training conferences. Officer Morgan and Vader are assigned to late shift, but can be called in for critical incidents at any time of the day.



2013 marked the first full year of Vader and Officer Morgan working as a K-9 unit team. Early in 2013, Vader assisted Officer Morgan in seizing \$4,000 cash that was suspected as being obtained from the sale of narcotics. PO Morgan and Vader participated in Milwaukee Emergency Center for Animal's Vest a Dog fundraiser, Brown Deer's Night Out for Justice, and the Parks and Recreation "Meet K-9 Vader" program.



The funds to purchase Vader were donated by the Stan Kass family, who has been very generous over the years in their support of Brown Deer's K-9 program. Vader's food is donated by Fromm Family Foods for his entire life, and his grooming is donated by Community Bark in Bayside. Many other donors have made the sustained operation of this K-9 Unit possible.



Firearms Range Remodel



In 2013 the Brown Deer Police Department indoor firearms range underwent a remodel. The range, which is used by several North Shore agencies, underwent the remodel to upgrade the bullet trap and the overall appearance of the range.

The remodel involved removing the old, steel bullet trap and replacing it with a modern technology, crushed rubber trap. The crushed rubber trap has several advantages over the steel bullet trap previously in place. One advantage is the variety of ammunition that can be fired on the range. Officers are now able to fire .223 rifle ammunition, shotgun slugs, shotgun buck shot and any caliber of handgun ammunition. In the past the steel bullet trap was limited to handgun ammunition. This will allow officers to obtain more repetition and an overall familiarity with squad rifles and shotguns.



The crushed rubber trap also reduces the chance of ricochets and allows for officers to engage in cross range and close distance firing more safely. This is due in part to ballistic paneling added to the walls down a portion of the range. Along with the installation of the new bullet trap and ballistic paneling, the range floor was also resurfaced and the walls painted.

The range has been used by several North Shore departments since the remodel, including the Brown Deer Police Department, and positive reviews have been received from officers and firearms instructors.
