During the month of February the Brown Deer Police Department responded to 1238 calls for service, issued 421 traffic citations, 141 parking citations and made 110 non-traffic related arrests/citations. Overall activity level was slightly higher when compared with the prior year.


Chief's Report



Police Clerk Mark Junk celebrated 25 years with the Police Department on February 27th.


**2014/2015 Year to Date
Calls for Service**




**2014/2015 Year to Date

February 2014/2015**




February 2015 Allocation of Police Services




General Calls for Service – Complaints that typically do not require a police report and/or those that occur infrequently enough that they can't be assigned to one of the listed categories. Examples would be disabled vehicles, death investigations, code violations, etc.

Thefts – Includes Retail Thefts which account for approximately 63% of the total theft complaints.
