


NORTH SHORE HEALTH DEPARTMENT

Elizabethkingia refers to bacteria from the Elizabethkingia genus. It has recently been in the news because Southern and Southeastern Wisconsin have seen a spike in cases of one genus -- Elizabethkingia anopheles -- and many of these initial patients died. The bacterium is widely present in nature, but is not commonly found in humans. Since November, there have been 52 confirmed cases in Wisconsin, and additional patients are currently under investigation. The majority of cases are over the age of 65, and all patients have a history of at least one underlying serious illness.



When Elizabethkingia bacteria enter the body, they can cause bloodstream infections. A healthy person's immune system can fight the bacteria, while a person who is immunocompromised may not be able to. Healthcare providers know to look for Elizabethkingia infection, especially in patients who have underlying illnesses. When treated promptly with proper antibiotics, patients have a great chance of survival. At this time, the cause of the outbreak is unknown, but epidemiologists from the State Division of Public Health (DPH) and the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) are working to investigate any and all potential causes, and so far the water supply has been ruled out. Staff from the Health Department participated in a local work group's meeting and presentation about biosurveillance. The definition of **Biosurveillance** is "a process of gathering, integrating, interpreting, and communicating essential information that might relate to disease activity and threats to human, animal, or plant health".

The group is part of a national program that monitors for infectious disease in the environment, along with response planning. It is just one way that the North Shore Health Dept. collaborates at a national level to gather information on disease activity and protect the health of people in the North Shore.

Vest For Life...Donated Ballistic Vests

Police Officers across the United States and the world are working the streets without a bullet-resistant vest. The Vest for Life Program was created by the Armor of God Project with a goal to provide a free vest to officers who are not otherwise provided one.

Thousands of law enforcement professionals in the United States and around the world are working in dangerous environments and do not have ballistic vests to protect them. The Armor of God Project is dedicated to protecting those who protect us and created a program to recycle and redistribute donated vests. Thousands of officers are graciously provided a new ballistic vest every five years by their communities and while the manufacturer warranty may be expired, often the vest will still effectively protect those that do not have one.

Our agency is fortunate enough to have ballistic vests replaced on a regular basis. Sergeant Amy Koeppel attended the "Below 100" training which is focused on reducing the number of Law Enforcement deaths to fewer than 100 each year. To reach this goal they promote wearing ballistic vests, safe driving, etc. Sergeant Koeppel took it upon herself to organize the collection of eleven ballistic vests from our department to contribute to the Vest for Life Program. She is hoping to organize similar drives in the coming years.

So far over 8,200 vests have been donated to officers in need by the Vest for Life Program. Their main emphasis is providing vests to officers within the United States. As interesting as the story may be, they will not provide information on the recipient of the vest due to safety reasons.

Did you know?



On February 29, 2016, Governor Scott Walker signed into law a law requiring drivers to turn on their vehicle headlights when weather conditions limit visibility. While this was common sense for many drivers, other drivers sometimes require a mandate to employ common sense.

The language, added by statute, defines the type of weather conditions: 340.01(43e) "Period of limited visibility" means any time that weather conditions limit visibility such that objects on a highway are not clearly discernible at 500 feet from the front of a vehicle.

In other words, turn your headlights on in heavy rain, snow and fog when you cannot see 500 feet (less than two football fields or about five basketball courts) in front of your vehicle.
