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
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
We Love Brown Deer Public Schools Campaign

Our Next Chapter - “Defining our Destiny 2.0 - Imagine the Possibilities”

Over the last six years the world landscape has changed dramatically with a more globally connected economy and higher expectations for teaching and deeper learning. What we learned from the last plan was that transformation was possible with the understanding of best practice research and right systems in place to drive continuous improvement. With the leadership of the board of education, staff, administrative team, and school community we set the stage for transformation by aligning systems and our resources. We acknowledge we still have work to do but are committed to higher levels of educational excellence for all students. While we embrace the past and reaffirm our collective work, it’s now time to renew, refresh, and include new perspectives.

In terms of our Brown Deer school community, the Village has also dramatically changed with increased diversity, mobility, and socio-economic challenges. It is now our call to action to engage all voices of our stakeholders at whatever level they can enter into this process. We will adapt to the needs of our school community by providing numerous opportunities for input at already scheduled school events, conduct focus groups, collect surveys, and attend group gatherings. Together we will create a new future for our students that will prepare them to lead the world by honoring people’s voices.

Our new plan - “Defining our Destiny 2.0 - Imagine the Possibilities” will not chart a new course but we will stay the course building upon what we have learned, reviewing new research and imagining our possibilities forward. Our current mission and vision statements still evoke emotion, reflect our purpose and aspired future. We will continue with those essential and integral aspects of our plan. We will continue to articulate our values keeping in mind our changing community and refine our goals to elevate our educational priorities to provide a world-class education for all students.

In December of 2017, the board of education approved using a “Future Search” process to engage as many stakeholders as possible to find common ground. The board considered several different facilitators to find a process that would engage more voices from our diverse school community. The board approved working with Drew Howick from Patina Solutions, an experienced planner to help guide us on our next journey of strategic planning.

An integral aspect of the future search process was to

create a design team comprised of diverse key stakeholders from the school community - alumni, clergy, village leaders, parents, students, university partners, board members and administrators. Their task was to meet several times in an effort to identify what and how people should be engaged in a future conversation about the educational priorities of the school district. Their purpose was to engage all stakeholders in identifying what it means to be a successful graduate of Brown Deer academically, socially and emotionally to enrich the world in which we live. With their input a community conversation was organized to develop common ground and focus on the future - “What is our vision of our Brown Deer graduate?” Saturday, May 13, 2017 was selected as the day to bring all different sectors from the community together. To everyone’s delight, we had over 85 diverse school community members gather on a beautiful day to engage around their perspectives and bold vision for world-class education for our students. There were senior citizens, students, board members, staff, new families, prospective families to the district, school volunteers, business owners, current families and parents, foster-care moms, and our community chaplain.

Running parallel to the design team and community conversation process was a “going to the people” plan. To obtain more diversity of thought, the administrative team went to local organizations and nonprofits in the community during their respective meetings. Feedback was collected around three critical questions: 1.) Other than finances, what are the top three challenges you see facing the district in the next years? 2.) If you could change one thing to our educational process or programs, what would that be? and 3.) What skills do our students need to be leaders? We had thousands of responses to

All of the information collected from this process and the community conversation has been distilled by the leadership teams across the district to develop our updated plan.

In conclusion, BDS D has continued on a transformational journey to create the right systems needed to reinvent and empower the school community. Through this engagement process we now have an intentional framework in which to implement our vision of a graduate. We are grateful for the time and investment of our school community in this very important work. Please join us as we embark on this next phase of "Defining Our Destiny 2.0" as we all imagine the possibilities for our students in creating passionate learners, creative thinkers, and innovative leaders who enrich and will lead the world. The Board of Education will approve the final aspects of the strategic plan in the next month and we look forward to working together to create the best educational system possible in Brown Deer. 6. Enhance school board governance to ensure a world-class education for all students



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
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BDPD's Newest Officers

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Partisan Primary Election: Tuesday, August 14

Election Requirements

As a reminder, effective with the Spring 2016 Primary Election, you must now provide photo I.D., state your full name and address out loud when requesting a ballot on Election Day; and sign the poll book or a ballot will not be issued.

Polling places are Trinity Church, 9450 N. 60th St.; Brown Deer Library, 5600 W. Bradley Road; and The Lois and Tom Dolan Community Center, 4355 W. Bradley Road.

Absentee Voting

To vote absentee, you must be a registered voter in the Village of Brown Deer. If you wish to receive your ballot by mail, please complete an Application for Absentee Ballot (Form EL-121) and submit it to the Clerk's Office. Please be sure to include a copy of your photo I.D. If you elect to vote absentee in-person at the Clerk's office, you will be asked to show your photo I.D. and state your full name and address out loud. College students who intend to vote in Brown Deer, please remember to register and request your absentee ballot before you leave for school. Please be sure to include a copy of your photo I.D. Your other option is to register and vote in your college town.

Are You Registered to Vote?

- Are you new to the Village of Brown Deer?
- Have you changed your name since you last voted?
- Have you changed your address within the Village?
- Moved from one apartment to another?

If so, you must register to be able to vote at the next election. Complete the Voter Registration Application (Form EL-131) at Village Hall, Mondays-Fridays, 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m., or print the form from our website at: www.browndeerwi.org.

You can also register online using My Vote WI: www.myvote.wi.gov.

In addition to the form, you are required to provide proof of residence, such as a copy of your driver's license, state ID, utility bill, real estate tax bill, residential lease, bank statement, or paycheck. These items must include your name and the address at which you wish to register.

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

Don Esche a sharp mind, beloved face at Water Utility for 60 years

There are some people who demand front and center stage and there are others who quietly do the work behind the scenes and never demand accolades: Don Esche—an accountant with the water utility—is the latter type of individual and he has been serving the village in this manner for 60 years.

Esche, who is 92 this month, began his tenure with the water department when he was appointed as one of the original members of the Brown Deer Water Utility Commission in 1958. He was a member of the Board of Appeals at the time, but his help was needed elsewhere as things were in a bit of disarray as far as the water was concerned.

“I was one of the first water commissioners appointed,” said Esche. “The village manager at the time got a letter from the PSC (Public Service Commission) saying we hadn’t filed a report for the year. No one knew anything about a report and no one knew anything about accounting so they said to me, ‘You do it!’ and I have been doing it ever since.”

As an accountant for the Department of Revenue, Esche brought his expertise as a tax auditor—to the village on a volunteer basis, coming into Village Hall to work the books after his day job.

According to Tom Nennig, Superintendent of Water

Utility for the village, Brown Deer—which was operating on a private well system in 1958—had one of the highest water rates and was having a lot of problems at the time Esche came aboard. Esche, said Nennig, was instrumental in figuring out a better system and obtaining a more cost-effective rate for the village.

“Don and his fellow commissioners were tasked with piecing everything together, connecting the various subdivisions’ wells,” explained Nennig, adding that Esche also helped negotiated a deal to bring Milwaukee water into the village in 1964. “He has really done a lot for the village and the water utility.”

Esche fell into accounting rather organically. Born in Milwaukee, he attended North Division High School and after two years in the Air Force from 1944 to 1946 (“The war ended before I got any flying time,” he said) he headed to school for a degree in accounting. He made this career choice both because it was an area in which he excelled and because the job market was good.

“Don’s knowledge has helped keep our water rates one of the lowest in the Milwaukee area while expanding service through the village,” said Nennig. “He has made sure our utility accounting standards are the best in the business.”

Esche has spent the last six-plus decades not only invested in the Water Utility, but in the village itself.

A resident since 1954, Esche has his roots firmly planted in Brown Deer. He and his wife, Helen, raised four children—David, James, John and Donna—in the village and the couple will celebrate 69 years of marriage in May.

The secret to a long, happy marriage is two-fold, says Esche: “You’ve got to say ‘Yes, Dear’ a lot,” he laughed. “Also, you have to find a good one. I found a good one. That’s the first requisite.” He and Helen now have nine grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

In 2016, Esche served as Grand Marshal of the village Fourth of July parade.

Nennig said Esche also serves as his go-to historian.

“Don and his wife have invested their time in the community and Don is the person I go to for history of the village,” he said. “His stories are fascinating.”

Added Water Clerk Jayne Jacobsen: “One of the things that comes to mind when you talk about Brown Deer is the spirit of volunteerism and Don really exemplifies that.”

Esche said he plans to enjoy his newfound free time playing cards, cutting wood in the basement and spending more time up north. He said he is ready to move on, but that he will always look back fondly on his time with the water department.

“It’s been a very rewarding experience,” he said. “It’s been fun working with everyone and watching the water utility grow. Brown Deer is a very good village. I’ve every enjoyed minute. It’s been a good life.”

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Mary Witman recalls nearly 30 years of service at the village library, health department

After nearly 30 years of serving Brown Deer, Mary Witman is saying goodbye to the village—at least from a professional standpoint—and it is a bittersweet departure.

Following 15 years as an assistant at the Brown Deer Public Library and then 14 years as administrative assistant for the North Shore Health Department, Witman said she knows it is time to bow out gracefully.

After growing up in Menomonee Falls and studying sociology and social services at Mount Mary College, Witman took an administrative assistant job at the news station. This is where she met her future husband Dave with whom she will celebrate 40 years of marriage this month.

The couple had two children, Susan and Michael, and in 1987, they settled in Brown Deer. Witman sought a position in the school district so that she could be on a similar schedule to her children.

Witman briefly worked at Brown Deer High School and then took on a part-time job at the library.

In 2004 Witman switched gears to the village health department—which merged with several surrounding communities in 2012 to become the North Shore Health Department. Witman named handing out buckets after an area flood and setting up immunization clinics for the H1N1 virus as some of the major community involvements of the health department during her

tenure.

Ann Christiansen, director and health officer at the department since 2015, said Witman will be greatly missed, both for all her hard work but also for her pleasant and helpful personality.

“Mary was the initial face of the health department,” Christiansen said of Witman’s front-desk role. “She interacted with so many people and directed so many calls, routing people to where they could find the necessary information. We will miss her customer service and her ability to be able to handle the variety of issues our department works on. She has definitely played a key gatekeeper role here.”

However, even though it will not be in a professional capacity, Witman plans to keep her presence alive and well in the community.

“I have really nice neighbors and I like getting to know the different people around here,” she said of her life in Brown Deer. “I love the events and the gatherings the village plans for the community. The police are wonderful. The Department of Public Works, the Water Department, the building inspectors, all the people who work for the village are tremendous.”

Now Witman looks forward to going fishing with her husband, taking an Alaskan cruise, and visiting relatives, to name a few of her plans, but she takes with her good memories.

Referendum Update

By the time this magazine is published, the referendum vote will have been conducted. If the referendum is approved, we would make plans to enhance security at the elementary school with a secured entrance, add additional elementary classroom space to prepare for any additional growth, construct an addition at the Middle/High School for sixth graders, remodel for an expanded middle school commons, kitchen and library media center, in addition to safety upgrades. Career and technical education space would also be updated and improved including acquisition of furnishing, new lockers, and related site improvements. High School Graduation - Special Announcements

We look forward to the most celebrated ceremony of academic achievement each year at our annual commencement ceremony. **This year's graduation is scheduled at the Brown Deer Novak Family Field House for Sunday, June 3, 2018 at 12:45 p.m.** Doors to the field house will close at this time and any latecomers will be directed to watch the ceremony live stream in our Multicultural Arts Center (MAC). Construction Program's Industry Advisory for Seniors

It's 7:15 a.m. and 14 seniors are voluntarily showing up early to school four days a week to prepare themselves for their careers after high school. It's not a class. It's not for a grade. It's self-motivation to prepare themselves for life starting Monday, June 4 –the day after graduation.

All of this is for a program called the "Industry Advisory," which is a partnership between Brown Deer School District, North Central States Regional Council of Carpenters (NCSRCC), and the sponsoring contractors, CG Schmidt and BSI. Through the organizing structure of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters, these 14 students will be offered a job as a carpenter's apprenticeship with one of the sponsor contractors. This is a first of its kind program and partnership, and the NCSRCC is closely monitoring it so that it will be successful and replicable across their six-state territory in the Midwest.

Instead of succumbing to "senior-itis" in their final semester of school, these students are learning print reading, interior systems framing, and drywall hanging. This is made possible by curriculum donations from the NCSRCC, material donations from the sponsoring contractors, and tool donations from DeWalt. Students are also preparing professional resumes, practice interviewing, and identifying what trade they are passionate about. At Parent-Teacher Conferences, parents thanked the school for making this last semester the easiest one yet with their student, because the students are getting themselves out of bed on their own (for the first time), and getting out the door without their parents hounding them (like the previous seven semesters).



Jake Schimenz had a goal to play professional sports overseas.

He figured if an opportunity arose, it would be through baseball, the sport he played in college.

But conversations with fellow athletes at Sterling College led the former Brown Deer High School standout to realize there could be opportunities to play professional football.

Schimenz began emailing highlight film and a sales pitch to teams across the world.

A Brazilian football team was the first to express interest, and Schimenz was soon off to begin his professional career with Tomahawk in the town of Limeira.

"I really had no expectations," Schimenz said. "I had no idea

what to think of football overseas. I didn't know what the competition would be like."

Schimenz was a multi-sport standout in baseball, basketball, football and track and field at Brown Deer.

He was a two-time All-State infielder for the baseball team, a four-year letterwinner on the basketball team and qualified for the state track meet on four different occasions, including winning the 800-meter state title as a sophomore in 2011.

For Schimenz, this wasn't a one-year trial. He plans on returning to Tomahawk in late January.

Teams play games every other week in Brazil, leaving the season to last from late February into December. In addition to playing at the state level, Tomahawk will also play at the national level throughout Brazil this season.

Schimenz hopes to one day reach the Arena Football League or the Canadian Football League but is taking his career one step at a time for now.

"Like anything, you have to work your way from the bottom all the way up," Schimenz said. "I'm enjoying traveling the world. Right now, I'm just getting my feet wet. I love Brazil. I don't have any plans of leaving anytime soon. I'll just take it year to year.

"I want to continue to spread the game of football and get other countries to enjoy it, as well."

Green Brook Drive. The vacant parcel was acquired from Rite-Hite and enabled the Village to build an expanded Public Works Garage and Vehicle Maintenance Facility.



The existing DPW site will be made available for commercial development as part of a TIF district. In 2015, a feasibility and space needs study was conducted by Bray Architects. The findings concluded that the Department of Public Works (DPW) had the most pressing need for capital improvements and space. Currently, the DPW occupies approximately 29,500 square feet at the existing site. The current 43rd Street site is approximately 4 acres in size and houses the DPW and Water Departments. The DPW operations consist of 16 total employees, (12) FTE's, (2) PTE's, year around and (2) PT seasonal. The Water operations consists of 5 total employees, (1) FTE, (1) PTE, (1) seasonal and (2) contracted employees. The new facility will be 51,060 SF and include office space, locker rooms, training room, conference room, vehicle garage storage, mezzanine storage, shops for

mechanic, water utility, signs, and sanitary sewer. The Park & Rec department will move over to the building from Village Hall. Additionally, the Village renovations will occur for the Health Department and Police Department along with the construction of a new Police Garage adjacent to the shooting range.



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

AMERICAN RED CROSS LEARN TO SWIM PROGRAM

Open to Children and Teens

American Red Cross water safety classes will be held at Brown Deer Middle/High School Pool. If you are not sure which level your child should enroll in, please contact the Park and Recreation Department at **(414) 371-3070** before registering.

NOTE: If your child needs adjustment to the water and requires additional assistance, please advise the Park and Recreation Department at registration.

Children 6 Months Through 5 Years

Parent/Child: Children 6 months-4 years old. Parent is in the water with their child.

Pre-School 1: Children ages 3-5 who need water adjustment or first time in water. No parent is in the water.

Pre-School 2: Orients children ages 4-5 to the aquatic environment and basic aquatic skills.

Pre-School 3: Children ages 4-5 will start to gain basic swimming propulsive skills to be comfortable in and around water.

Learn to Swim Levels

Ages 6 and Older

Level 1: Helps students feel comfortable in the water. Participants learn to enter and exit the water safely, fully submerge their head, exhale underwater, float on their fronts and backs with support and begin to swim on their fronts and backs using arm/leg action.

Level 2: Gives students independent success with fundamental skills. Participants learn to independently enter and exit the water safely, swim on their sides, submerge entire head for five seconds, float on their fronts and backs without support, glide on their fronts and backs unsupported and swim on their fronts and backs using combined strokes for 15 feet unsupported.

Level 3: Builds on skills learned in Level 2. Participants learn to jump into deep water from the side, dive from kneeling or standing position, perform front and back float for 30 seconds, swim front crawl for 15 yards, swim back crawl for 15 yards, the butterfly kick and the butterfly body motion.

Level 4: Develops confidence and strength to improve skills learned and introduces new aquatic skills. Participants learn to swim underwater, perform a feet-first surface dive, perform open turns on their front and back, tread water for one minute, swim front and back crawl for 25 yards, swim breaststroke and elementary backstroke for 15 yards, swim butterfly for 15 yards and swim on their sides using a scissors kick for 15 yards.

Level 5: Provides further coordination and refinement of strokes, swimming further distances. Participants learn to tread water for two minutes, perform standing dives, swim sidestroke and elementary backstroke for 25 yards, perform tuck and pike surface dives, perform front and back flip turns, swim front and back crawl for 50 yards and swim butterfly and breaststroke for 25 yards.

Level 6: Refines strokes so students swim them with ease, efficiency, power and smoothness over greater distances.

Swim Assessment

Swim assessments are offered to swimmers who are new to our Swim Lessons or who are returning after a break from lessons. Staff will provide one-on-one skill screening for placement and will introduce new swimmers to the Brown Deer Middle/High School Pool. 

The **Brown Deer Recreational Trail** is located along the Wisconsin Electric Power Co. right of way between W. Brown Deer Road and W. County Line Road. Park in the Village Hall parking lot, 4800 W. Green Brook Drive, and access the trail from Village Park. This trail connects the Milwaukee Oak Leaf Trail to the Ozaukee Interurban Trail.

The **Oak Leaf Trail** is 96.4 miles and meanders in and around the city of Milwaukee on a changing terrain of flat rural plains and hilly city streets - and connects all of the major parks in Milwaukee County. The trail carries you down to beautiful Lake Michigan and its beaches, all adding up to a great ride.

The **Ozaukee Interurban Trail** is a 32-mile path through the communities of Mequon, Thiensville, Cedarburg, Grafton, Port Washington, Belgium and Cedar Grove. This trail route connects historic downtowns with natural landscapes. Views along the Trail include woodlands, wetlands, farmlands, Cedar Creek, the Milwaukee River and Lake Michigan – and is designated as a hotspot for birding.
