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

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Brown Deer Honored by National Civic League as All-America City

On June 19, 2016, a contingent of thirteen representatives from the Village of Brown Deer and School District of Brown Deer received the “All-America City” award for their amazing presentation of how the community ensures that all children are successful in school and life. The award, given to 10 communities each year, celebrates and recognizes neighborhoods, villages, towns, cities, counties, tribes and regions that engage residents in innovative, inclusive and effective efforts to tackle critical challenges. Community presentations are also an essential part of the All-America City experience. Finalist communities have 10 minutes to present the story of their work and their community to a

jury of national civic experts. Communities are free to create performances that best tell their story—including everything from straightforward presentations to skits, from mock TV shows to heartfelt stories, from dancing to spoken-word poetry and rap.

The National Civic League trip was an experience of a lifetime

for all involved: students, teachers, school and village administrators and truly represented Brown Deer’s innovation, effective community problem-solving, and collaborative spirit.

You may be wondering how did we come together to

work on this project? Last February, Village Trustee Jeff Baker brought the idea back to the Village staff while attending a conference. Village and School District staff met to determine if developing an application was even feasible as the deadline was only 3 weeks away. We believed we had three wonderful projects related to the theme: 1) Badger Meter Park and access to green space, 2) The Master Campus Plan of the School District, 3) Award-winning State Character Education program at Brown Deer Middle/High School. On March 9, 2016 the application was sent out to the National Civic League. We had no idea of how we would fare but knew this was a great way to work together to tell our Brown Deer story. Our 4.5-square-mile Village of Brown Deer may be small compared to some other nearby suburbs, but we hoped our ideas of creating a great village and school system—and one of the very few racially integrated area communities would resonate with the selection committee.

Then on March 24, 2016 we got the email that announced our selection! We almost missed it as it went into the spam folder! Twenty cities were selected ranging from Connecticut to California, from small to large, and rural to urban. Brown Deer was the only representative from Wisconsin and the second smallest city invited. Two years ago, Eau Claire made the trip and was designated as an All-America City joining only four other past Wisconsin winners including: Racine 2003, Green Bay 1999, Wausau 1984 and Madison 1978. Only 550 cities nationwide have even won the award since its inception in 1949.

While we were thrilled with the announcement, the reality of what we would present and how we would get to Denver, Colorado became a daunting task. We didn’t have

a funding mechanism to pay for this event as both Village and School District budgets were set. However, just like the cooperation you see every day in our Brown Deer Village, two community leaders stepped up to assist us to develop a 60-day plan to get us to Denver. Marge Jaberg, President of the Brown Deer Foundation, and Barbara Fleming, President of the Education Foundation of Brown Deer, met with the Village and School District administrators to set goals for the funding that would be needed. With their great organizational skills and ideas we set a fundraising goal of \$15,000 that would cover the registration, transportation, housing, supplies and food costs. A silent auction held at the Village Volunteer Awards program sponsored by the Brown Deer Foundation garnered over \$1,200 as our first attempt to raise the much needed funds by May 30. Village and School District staff worked together to solicit funds by visiting local business partners. The Education Foundation reached out to our Brown Deer alumni. Within two weeks, we had surpassed our budget goal and raised \$25,000 in donated funds! This is exactly what happens in an All-America City when we come together and identify our challenges and work together to find solutions. We were living the All-America City mission through this process.

Special thanks goes to Rich Meussen-Badger Meter, Milwaukee Bucks player (and Brown Deer alum) Steve Novak, the NBA Players Association for a matching donation, Julie Cook-Quirk, who designed our logo for shirts and buttons, Ann Griffin for making the 150 buttons, Assistant Village Manager Erin Hirn, who gathered materials for the community fair, the Village and School District Boards for supporting the trip, the parents of the students who entrusted us with their children for the trip to Denver, the students, teachers, and administration, and all of those that volunteered time to prepare our delegation.

The Brown Deer delegation included: Nate Piotrowski - Community Development Director, Tosha Womack-Brown Deer Middle/High Principal, Dr. Deb Kerr-Brown Deer Superintendent, Patrick Schmitz-theater teacher and writer of the presentation, Tyler Brownfield-band director, and eight Brown Deer students--Raeden Bostwick-Blazer (AKA Freddy Falcon), Jordan Caple, Briana Key, Maliah King, Antonio Montiel, Armon Sample, Calvin Vang and Megan

Yang.

"All-America Cities are places where people are coming together to address important issues like youth success and racial equity," said Doug Linkhart, the President of the National Civic League. "These cities and towns are harnessing the power of community to build their own future."

On behalf of the Brown Deer delegation we were honored to represent Brown Deer and thank everyone for their support in getting us to Denver to tell our Brown Deer story. It truly does take a Village!



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Brown Deer Middle/High School one of 67 schools in state to Win National Character Education Award

Character.org, a non-profit organization that supports the advancement of character development in schools, communities and workplaces across the U.S. and globally, designated 67 schools and four districts from 15 states as National Schools and Districts of Character for 2016.

The Brown Deer Middle/High School is one of the designated schools. "The Brown Deer Middle/High School is very grateful and honored to be recognized by Character.org as one of the 2016 National Schools of Character. We are also proud of all of the students, teachers, staff members, parents and community members who have embraced the Brown Deer Way not only in our schools, but in their homes and businesses throughout the community," said Principal, Tosha Womack.

Character education is an educational movement that supports the social, emotional and ethical development of students. It is the proactive effort by schools, districts, communities and states to help students develop important core ethical (recognizing what's right) and performance (doing what's right) values such as caring, honesty, diligence, fairness, fortitude, responsibility, grit, creativity, critical thinking and respect for self and others.

Since the inception of Character.org's Schools of Character program's in 1998, more than 263 schools and 14 districts have been designated as National Schools or Districts of Character, impacting more than 600,000 students' lives. In addition, this year two international schools have applied and will be evaluated for international recognition as a part of a pilot international program once the National Schools of Character have been announced.

Each year, Character.org (formerly The Character Education Partnership) and its state affiliates select schools and districts that demonstrate a dedicated focus on character development programs that show positive impact on academic achievement, student behavior and school climate. Schools and districts selected in January as State Schools of Character, along with those schools who reapplied in their three-year designation of State School of Character, were forwarded to Character.org for consideration for national recognition as National Schools of Character.

Through an in-depth and rigorous evaluation process, these schools were found to be exemplary models of

character development. Of the schools named this year, one district and 14 schools are former National Schools of Character reapplying for the national designation. Criteria for selection are based on Character.org's 11 Principles of Effective Character Education, a guide to providing students with opportunities for moral action, fostering shared leadership and engaging families and communities as partners in the character-building effort.

"We are extremely proud of this year's designated schools and districts for their dedication to character development which has proven to increase the well-being of so many students' lives across the United States and beyond," said Becky Sipos, Character.org's President and CEO. "These character initiatives create conditions for learning where students are thriving and growing into ethical members of our society. They are developing lifelong skillsets they will leverage well into their adult lives."

We are also proud of all of the students, teachers, staff members, parents and community members who have embraced the Brown Deer Way not only in our schools, but in their homes and businesses throughout the community," said Principal, Tosha Womack.

Character.org will honor the designated schools and districts at its 23rd National Forum on Character Education to be held the weekend of Oct. 14-15, 2016, in Washington, DC. Superintendent Dr. Deb Kerr proudly shared with the board of education, "What set Brown Deer apart from other districts was the involvement of student leaders from the inception of the program several years ago. Students and teachers working together to plan relevant lessons. One of the hallmarks of our program is that students co-teach the lessons with our faculty. This is a win-win for everyone involved. Brown Deer is the place to be where people are willing to work together for the common good of all."

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
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



was provided to the School District to support Trauma Sensitive Schools Training for all district staff members.



School District Updates Fall 2016

School Registration

Any resident who has not yet registered their children for the 2016-17 school year and who has not attended Forms and Fees Days needs to contact the District Office as soon as possible. Both new and returning families need to verify residency and complete the enrollment process. We need your information to complete the scheduling process. It is especially important that new students to the district register as soon as possible, so they can be scheduled for new student orientation on August 18th.

First Day of School

Sept. 1 is the first day of school for students and the official start to the 2016-17 school year. Please drive carefully and be patient as parents and students get back into their school routines. Remember to watch out for our dedicated crossing guards and for students crossing.

Bus Route Changes

Please be certain to watch for information regarding your child's pick-up location if transported by school bus. In an effort to shorten the time students are riding to and from school on the bus, the district will be working with Riteway to consolidate some stops in a accordance with School Board Policy 751.

School Lunch Prices

The school lunch prices for the 2016-17 school year are \$2.35 at the elementary school and \$2.55 at the middle/high school.

For adults, the price is \$3.45. If your child qualifies for a reduced-price lunch, the fee is \$0.40. The price for extra milk has increased to \$0.45.

Lunch Program Applications Now Being Accepted

The School District of Brown Deer participates in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP). The program's 2016-2017 household size and income criteria are used to determine eligibility. Applications are available in the online registration process. If you would like to utilize this program please complete the application at the time of registration or during the Forms and Fees Days. Completion of the online application prior to the start of the school year will ensure eligible students are added to the program without a lapse in service.

If a family qualified for free or reduced-price lunch last school year, they must reapply within the first 30 days of school to remain eligible. Application forms are available at the District Office. Completed applications will be accepted throughout the school year. If you have any questions regarding this program, please contact the district office at 414-371-6750.

Learning and Leading All Year Long



SCHOOL DISTRICT WEBSITE Under Construction

As part of our strategic action plan for communication, the School District began to evaluate its website for access to content, graphic representation and navigation. The district took a look at several companies that provide sites for school districts as well as various sites from other businesses and districts as part of our research. Our goal was to secure a provider at reduced costs while increasing the level of customer service available through the use of our website. We know that timely communication is accomplished through the use of our website and that parents, prospective parents, and school community frequent the website daily. We selected CMS4 Schools as our provider. A number of districts utilize CMS4 Schools which is managed through CESA 6 out of Oshkosh. We worked with designers to hone in on items that are important to users. For example, parents want to see things like lunch menus, have easy access to view their child's grades and know where to go to contact someone at the school in case of a problem. As a result, we have updated our faculty listings which are now searchable, so parents have easy access to teacher and principal contact information.

We also wanted to update the look of the website to better tell our Brown Deer story and market our mission, vision, values and goals. We look forward to launching the new site in the next month. 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A Part of Our Community, Jewish Family Services



When we think about community, we think about the things that make Brown Deer a special place to live: engaged and welcoming residents, commitment to volunteerism and concern for others, and dedicated leadership. It is no surprise that the Village has opened its arms to two housing residences established by Jewish Family Services (JFS), a not-for-profit that shares the Village's vision of community.

In 2010, JFS opened Deerwood Crossing Senior Residences, a community of 96 apartments for seniors with both independent and assisted living options. Located on the corner of Bradley Road and Sherman Boulevard, Deerwood Crossing promotes an age-in-place concept that allows residents to access services as they need them while remaining in the comfort of their residences. In accordance with the mission of JFS, nearly all of the apartments at Deerwood Crossing are affordable to residents who earn under 60% of the area median income. JFS is proud to partner with Goodwill Industries to provide dining and housekeeping services at Deerwood Crossing.

Two years later, JFS opened Bradley Crossing Supportive Housing Community across the street on

Bradley Road. Bradley Crossing is a unique housing community dedicated to providing housing and services to families and individuals with and without disabilities. Last summer, we expanded our campus to include four additional two-story buildings on Village Lane and Bradley Road. Bradley Crossing now contains a total of 114 one-, two-, and three-bedroom apartments – all of which are affordable, and half of which are reserved for households with disabilities. We are proud to house the Village of Brown Deer's Lois and Tom Dolan Community Center in our building. The final piece of our development will be a community space that we will construct on the vacant lot on Village Lane.

In addition to providing beautiful, secure, and affordable housing, JFS provides a range of educational, life skills, and recreational programming for residents that aims to improve their self-sufficiency and quality of life. Recent programming highlights include:

- a Back-to-School Fair, where 47 school-aged children received a backpack filled with school supplies. The Superintendent of the Brown Deer School District, two principals, and a representative from Children's Hospital of Wisconsin attended the fair;
- a gardening program on Village Lane and Woodale Avenue; and
- a holiday social potluck, produced by the residents of Bradley Crossing, which was attended by 75 residents.

In addition, Goodwill Industries recently visited to speak about training and employment opportunities for persons with disabilities, the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) led a seminar on mental health awareness, Associated Bank led seminars on financial literacy, and Wheaton Franciscan Hospital provided a program on breast cancer awareness. In the coming months, Silver Spring Neighborhood House will lead a multi-session seminar called, "Making Proud Choices," which addresses issues such as safe sex and alcohol and drug use with teens and their parents. These programs are in addition to the largest events of our year, the mobile food pantries, which involve a team of around 25 volunteers who run a food pantry on site which served 759 people – including participants of the Senior Lunch Program at the Dolan Community Center - at four pantries in 2015.

Today, six years after we opened our first building, our residents are delighted to call Brown Deer their home. We are always looking for volunteers to improve our programming. Volunteer opportunities include helping at our food pantry, working in our gardens, or serving as a "friendly visitor" to a senior who may be looking for companionship. 

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


Election Requirements

Effective with the Spring 2015 Primary Election, you must provide photo I.D., state your full name and address out loud when requesting a ballot on Election Day; and sign the poll book or a ballot will not be issued.

The polls will be open at all three polling locations from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Polling places are Trinity Church, 9450 North 60th Street; Brown Deer Library, 5600 West Bradley Road; and the Lois & Tom Dolan Community Center, 4355 West Bradley Road. Please contact the Clerk's Office or visit the Village website (www.browndeerwi.org) to determine your voting location.

Absentee Voting

To vote absentee, you must be a registered voter in the Village of Brown Deer. If you wish to receive your ballot by mail, please complete an Application for Absentee Ballot (Form EL-121) and submit it to the Clerk's Office. Please be sure to include a copy of your photo I.D. If you elect to vote absentee in-person at the Clerk's office, you will be asked to show your photo I.D. and state your full name and address out loud. College students who intend to vote in Brown Deer, please remember to register and request your absentee ballot before you leave for school. Please be sure to include a copy of your photo I.D. Your other option is to register and vote in your college town.

There is a need for more poll workers (also known as election inspectors). Election inspectors are required to work the entire Election Day from 6:30 a.m. until all of the paperwork is completed after the polls close at 8 p.m. Rate of pay is \$110.00 for the day and training is required prior to each election. The Village is seeking residents that must have good hearing, can sit for long periods of time, are fast/efficient in finding names and numbers in the poll books, have good penmanship if registering voters, and can follow directions.

Wisconsin Law Now Permits High School Students to Work the Polls on Election Day

The Wisconsin Elections Commission encourages high school students to get involved in the political process and to provide additional workers to serve at the polling place on Election Day. The Village is seeking interested high school students who would want to work the elections as voter registrars in various four-hour shifts. Students must be residents of Brown Deer, be 16, 17 or 18 years of age, have a B+ average, and have the consent of their parents and the high school. Students would be paid \$50.00 for working a minimum of four hours and for attending the training.

If so, you must register to be able to vote at the next election. Complete the Voter Registration Application (Form EL-131) at Village Hall, Mondays-Fridays, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., or print the form from our website at: www.browndeerwi.org.

You can also register online using My Vote WI: www.myvote.wi.gov.

In addition to the form, you are required to provide proof of residence, such as a copy of your driver's license, state ID, utility bill, real estate tax bill, residential lease, bank statement, or paycheck. These items must include (or contain) your name and the address at which you wish to register.

Don't Delay – Get Your Photo I.D. NOW if you Plan to Vote in November

Voter Identification is now required for voting on Election Day and/or if you elect to vote absentee in-person at the Clerk's Office or if you request an absentee ballot through the mail.

The website bringit.wi.gov explains I.D. requirements and exceptions. You can call toll free 866-868-3947 or contact your Municipal Clerk to ask specific questions about voting requirements. Photo I.D.s are required on Election Day. Acceptable forms of identification include:

- Wisconsin I.D. Card or Driver's License
- Passport
- Tribal I.D. Card
- Military Photo I.D. Card

If you do not have an acceptable form of I.D., you may have to get a free Wisconsin I.D. by going to a Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) office. To be issued a state I.D., bring original (not photocopied), documents to the DMV office that prove:

- Name and Date of Birth
- Citizenship or Legal Status
- Residence
- Identity

Some documents, such as a passport or certified birth certificate, may satisfy more than one requirement with a certified birth certificate, social security card, and utility or phone bill. The State has procedures to assist in obtaining a birth certificate for persons who do not possess one, but the process may take several weeks to complete.


If you do not have your I.D. yet, it's never too early to start. Election Day will be here before you know it. Don't wait!

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Village says farewell to familiar, friendly face Steve Ehlers

Patty Ehlers Peterson remembers her brother Steve Ehlers as someone who not only lived his passion, but always took others with him on the journey.

For Steve, it was all about the specialty cheeses, and as long as the local store owner held court behind the counter of Larry's Market on N. Deerwood Drive, he wanted everyone else to experience the fun right along with him.

"He loved interacting with customers," said Patty. "He loved sharing his knowledge and having everyone try the new cheeses that came in."

Sadly, Steve lost his battle with colon cancer on May 31 when he passed away at the age of 65.

So beloved was the Brown Deer favorite that "we have been overwhelmed with kind words and cards from people who knew Steve," said Patty, who manages the market that features an extensive cheese case and deli; homemade soups; wine and other specialty grocery items.

The store has a long history within the Ehlers family. Steve's father, Larry, who grew up on River Lane, not much more than a stone's throw from the business, worked at what was then the Brown Deer Food Market for years before purchasing the market and bestowing it with his moniker in 1970.

Steve worked alongside his father at the store as he grew up in Cedarburg with older brother, Jeff, and Patty, the youngest of the three siblings, delivering groceries to Lake Drive to prominent community members such as the Uihlein and Pabst families. Steve graduated from Cedarburg High School in 1969 and studied engineering at Georgia Tech for a year before leaving college to make his way through Europe, most significantly France.

Steve purchased the store with his wife, Cindy, in 1981. Soon after, he went to a food fair in New York and began what his sister describes as "his love affair with cheese." After meeting decorated Wisconsin cheese artisan Mike Gingrich at a show, Steve agreed to sell Gingrich's award-winning Pleasant Ridge Reserve at the market and so the journey began. In keeping with European tradition, Steve

would keep out a cutting board and allow customers to sample the wares before making their purchase.

As a member of both the American Cheese Society Board of Directors and the Dairy Business Innovation Center Board,

Steve didn't just want to do the best he could for himself, he wanted the next guy to succeed also, his sister said.

"Steve truly loved to help and mentor people," said Patty. "If he believed in you and your product, he was 100 percent behind you. He was very involved in the cheeses and helped a lot of people grow their product. He was also very honest and people appreciated that about him. If something wasn't working, he would tell you. People liked that."

More than just the face of the corner market, Steve was an involved and enthusiastic community member who always strived to make Brown Deer a go-to location. He was not only instrumental in starting the village's annual festival/marketplace Eat & Greet, but also the VIBES concert series of free local performers in the village park on select Wednesdays in the summer. Steve was also a past president of the Cedarburg Library Board and he served on the City of Cedarburg Board of Appeals. He and Cindy also volunteered for the Families Anonymous Program. The father of two now-grown sons, Andy and Peter, Steve was known as a smiling face who was happy to engage with customers of all ages.

"He loved little kids and kids loved him," said Patty.


When the village lost Steve, it lost both a piece of its past and a major part of its day-to-day fabric that makes the village of Brown Deer the colorful tapestry it is, but the show will go on, promised Patty.

"The market has definitely become a generational store," she said. "We have many longtime customers and we know many of them by name and what they like. The store has been here over 100 years and we're going to keep going."

Larry, now 92, still comes into the store for the Wednesday, Thursday and Friday lunches and the customers love to interact with him, Patty said of her father.

"The customers love to see him," she said. "The tradition will continue."

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National Breastfeeding Month

Regardless of whether a child is born in a high- or low-income country, or into a rich or poor family, breastfeeding prevents malnutrition and decreases the risk of obesity.

Breastfeeding improves long-term health, decreasing the risk of many non-communicable diseases, including asthma, diabetes, and heart disease in the baby, and cancer and obesity in the mother.

Breastfeeding is one of the top interventions to reduce child mortality. It is estimated that 13% of under-5 year old deaths could be avoided if optimal breastfeeding was achieved. Additionally, it saves billions of dollars in

healthcare costs by dramatically reducing hospital admissions for infectious diseases.

Breastfeeding is an investment in environmental sustainability, providing a renewable food that involves no packaging, storage, transportation or fuel to prepare.

Ghost Cars?

Here is one way to blend into the community--"Ghost Cars." What are "Ghost Cars"? They are a new innovative approach the police department is using to blend into the community. The new squads are black in color with black reflective decals. If you glance at them quickly you may not notice the police decals on the vehicle, but at certain angles or in the right light the police decals will reflect bright white. The police department is using these squads for regular patrol as well as for their High Visibility Traffic Enforcement (HVTE). This stealthy appearance allows the squads to be less noticeable when on routine patrol but when their full police lighting package is turned on, they are very recognizable as a police squad. AppeThai Brings True Taste of Thailand to Village

Walking into the recently-opened AppeThai, located at 3900 W. Brown Deer Road, Suite #110, a diner gets to experience traditional Thailand in their own backyard. With décor that is simple and casual but still contemporary, AppeThai presents a homey yet industrial look with every detail from the light fixtures to the bar stools to the artwork on the walls.

“I wanted to give that image and feel of Thailand,” said Bang Tongkumbunjong, who owns the restaurant with his wife, Pam, and works as the eatery’s chef. “This is something you don’t see around here.”

The look is just one aspect; what keeps customers returning is the menu of authentic Thai fare that features favorites such as Pad Thai, Pad See Ewe, and hot plates like volcano chicken; a variety of curry (red, green, yellow, duck and Massamun) and stir fry dishes; some spicy selections including the Pad Ped Moo Pah (wild boar); seafood options; soups, salads and appetizers and many more favorites. Daily specials, for both lunch and dinner, showcase the taste of Southeast Asia, from street food to homestyle dishes.

“I try to be as close to Thailand as possible in the ingredients that I use,” Bang said. “I use a lot of ingredients that most other Thai restaurants do not use.”

When the couple opened AppeThai this spring, they were looking to set down permanent roots in the community by feeding it well—something Bang has done for decades since arriving from Thailand in 1988 and becoming a chef at the much-loved The King & I

restaurant, owned by his aunt and uncle, in downtown Milwaukee.

In 2002 Bang opened Bang Thai Cuisine in Mequon and he operated the restaurant—as well as a coffee shop—until 2008 when he decided to take some time off and work as a consultant for a year. Bang spent the following six years at Cosi in Fox Point, but his heart kept coming back to his true passion of running his own restaurant so when he and Pam saw the open location in the village, the vision of AppeThai began taking shape.

“We saw the space and closed our eyes and this is what came about,” he said.

As the restaurant got up and running, Bang soon realized the loyal customers he had accumulated over the years had not forgotten about him and were quite pleased at his return to the kitchen. Since Bang and Pam opened the doors, they have had an overwhelmingly positive response, a mix of old and new customers. “Most people don’t know this is my place until they see me and then they say, ‘Oh, you’re back!’” said Bang. “This is the place where I can do what I do best. The customers appreciate what I do and I appreciate their support.”

But as much as he loves his day job, family comes first, said Bang, referring to Pam—who came from Thailand in 2006 and earned a master’s degree in marketing from Concordia University—and their three sons, ages 4, 6 and 8, as the couple closes the eatery on Sundays and holidays, and they often take long weekends.

“People don’t believe me when I say it’s not about the money, but that’s true,” said Bang. “It’s not about work, it’s about the balance between life and work and spending time with your family. “

Bang hopes his sons will respect the industry they were born into and look to their parents as role models, but that the restaurant will not dominate their lives.

“We want to give our boys the tools to live and experience what their mother and I do, but that will be one piece of the puzzle,” he said. “We want them to do whatever they want to do when they grow up and we will support that.”

The restaurant’s laidback and welcoming atmosphere is a reflection of Bang and Pam themselves—down-to-earth, engaging and pleasant.

“I’m simple: what you see is what you get,” Bang said. “I’m here to stay. I wake up in the morning and get to do what I love to do every day and make sure to the best of my ability that the customer is satisfied. I give the customer my best.”

As for complaints? Bring them on, he said. “I love to hear them!” said Bang. “I always want to know what I can do better the next time. Everything happens for a reason and hopefully this is my final journey.”

AppeThai also serves beer and wine and has an outdoor dining patio area. Business hours are 11 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. and 4:30 to 9 p.m. Monday through Friday and 4:30 to 9 p.m. Saturday. The restaurant is closed Sunday. To reach AppeThai or to learn about catering options, one can call (414) 362-4264.

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

AMERICAN RED CROSS LEARN TO SWIM PROGRAM

Open to Children and Teens

One 9-week session of American Red Cross water safety classes will be held at Brown Deer Middle/High School Pool, 8060 N. 60th Street. Participants must furnish their own suit, towel and lock for their locker. If you are not sure which level your child should enroll in, please contact the Park and Recreation Department at (414) 371-3075 before registering.

NOTE: If your child is in need of adjustment to the water and requires additional assistance, please advise the Park and Recreation Department at registration.

Children 6 Months Through 5 Years

- **Parent/Child** Children 6 months-4 years old. Parent is in the water with their child.
- **Pre-School 1 (formerly Tiny Tots)** Children ages 3-5 who need water adjustment or first time in water. No parent is in the water.
- **Pre-School 2 (formerly Junior Level 1)** Orients children ages 4-5 to the aquatic environment and basic aquatic skills.
- **Pre-School 3 (formerly Junior Level 2)** Children ages 4-5 will start to gain basic swimming propulsive skills to be comfortable in and around water.

Learn to Swim Levels

Ages 6 and Older

Level 1: Helps students feel comfortable in the water. Participants learn to enter and exit the water safely, fully submerge their head, exhale underwater, float on their fronts and backs with support, and begin to swim on their fronts and backs using arm/leg action.

Level 2: Gives students independent success with fundamental skills. Participants learn to independently enter and exit the water safely, swim on their sides, submerge entire head for five seconds, float on their fronts and backs without support, glide on their fronts and backs unsupported and swim on their fronts and backs using combined strokes for 15 feet unsupported.

Level 3: Builds on skills learned in Level 2. Participants learn to jump into deep water from the side, dive from kneeling or standing position, perform front and back float for 30 seconds, swim front crawl for 15 yards, swim back crawl for 15 yards, the butterfly kick and the butterfly body motion.

Level 4: Develops confidence and strength to improve skills learned and introduces new aquatic skills. Participants learn to swim underwater, perform a feet-first surface dive, perform open turns on their front and back, tread water for one minute, swim front and back crawl for 25 yards, swim breaststroke and elementary backstroke for 15 yards, swim butterfly for 15 yards and swim on their sides using a scissors kick for 15 yards.

Level 5: Provides further coordination and refinement of strokes, swimming further distances. Participants learn to tread water for two minutes, perform standing dives, swim sidestroke and elementary backstroke for 25 yards, perform tuck and pike surface dives, perform front and back flip turns, swim front and back crawl for 50 yards and swim butterfly and breaststroke for 25 yards.

Level 6: Refines strokes so students swim them with ease, efficiency, power and smoothness over greater distances.

Swim Assessment

Swim assessments are offered to swimmers who are new to our Swim Lessons or who are returning after a break from lessons. Staff will provide one-on-one skill screening for placement and will introduce new swimmers to the Brown Deer Middle/High School Pool. The **Brown Deer Recreational Trail** is located along the Wisconsin Electric Power Co. right of way between W. Brown Deer Road and W. County Line Road. Park in the Village Hall parking lot, 4800 W. Green Brook Drive, and access the trail from Village Park. This trail connects the Milwaukee Oak Leaf Trail to the Ozaukee Interurban Trail.

The **Oak Leaf Trail** is 96.4 miles and meanders in and around the city of Milwaukee on a changing terrain of flat rural plains and hilly city streets – and

connects all of the major parks in Milwaukee County. The trail carries you down to the beautiful Lake Michigan and its beaches, all adding up to a great ride.

The **Ozaukee Interurban Trail** is a 32-mile path through the communities of Mequon, Thiensville, Cedarburg, Grafton, Port Washington, Belgium and Cedar Grove. This trail route connects historic downtowns with natural landscapes. Views along the Trail include: woodlands, wetlands, farmlands, Cedar Creek, the Milwaukee River and Lake Michigan – and is designated as a hotspot for birding.
